We think that Dairyman, in view of the manner in which he proposes to discuss Pasteurized Milk, ought to append his name and address as Mr. McDonald has done. If he will not do this it would seem convenient to close the discussion for the present.

Some years ago in France compulsory military service for clergymen was ordered, and they were required to do their three years in the army like other citizens. A modification of this order has now been made by Gen. Andre, the Minister of War. Hereafter clergymen, medical and pharmaceutical students will be let off with one year's service, and during that time will not be incorporated into regiments but placed on hospital duty. It is claimed that the knowledge thus acquired of illnesses and their treatment will be of value to the clergy, especially in the country districts, enabling them to give hygienic counsel to their flocks.

The New York World relates two recent faith-cure experiments. In one case three children were seized with diphtheria. The mother a Christian Scientist, refused to employ a doctor, called in a healer and proceeded to treat the children with prayers, minus medicine. They grew worse, and too late the father called in a doctor. One child died and the mother is since reported "frantic with remorse and grief". In another case a Baptist minister's wife was taken down with small-pox in New York. But as she had been previously seized with the "prayer-cure" delusion, she too refused to call medical aid. She roamed about the apartment-house where she lived, travelled around on the street cars and finally, with the small-pox well developed, boarded a crowded train and travelled to her home in Southington, Conn. thus endangering the lives of hundreds of other persons. The World concludes that "prayer-cure" believers have a perfect right to pray and go to their graves without medicine. But they have no right to doom their defenceless children to death, nor to expose their neighbors to deadly contagion or infection merely as experiments with their belief."
