The School

Question

Is moral instruction any part of the educational training of the young or is it not? This is the question which in many countries is being pressed to the front; and whether the State or the various religious denominations stand sponsor for this duty, there is a growing conviction that some organized effort must be made to better guide children in the crucial essentials of conduct and character. It is justly pointed out that since the attempt was made in Russia to close down all the churches and completely secularize the national education, conditions have steadily gone from bad to worse, and amongst the young have become deplorable. The like problem has been raised in the United States, where of late years the "crime-wave" statistics have grown to such sinister proportions that the gravest anxiety prevails as to what one writer calls "our dissolving ethics," and it is felt that the moral sanctions for behaviour are not anywise strengthened by the jargon about "complexes" and all the rest of it. What seems above all to be required is some commonsense and direct instruction such as will enlighten and fortify the youthful mind against silly blunders of inexperience, and teach youth that the moral law is every whit as insistent as the law of gravitation, and that it is as needful to grow sound characters as it is to grow clean and wholesome plants. Never has there been a time in history when the freedom of the juvenile consciousness, tremendously enlarged in our day, needed more judicious guidance and a wise and understanding culture. Yet discipline is relaxed and moral instruction neglected, so that in the highest concerns of life the youngster is left to take his chance. The situation is pitifully described by a recent writer who says that "never has the road been wilder or the sign-posts fewer." In England the movement in favor of "fairplay for religious education" has taken shape by demanding that the non-provided schools be given more consideration and a better placement in the national educational system in order that they may have the same facilities for definite religious instruction as the schools controlled by local authorities and the State. It is estimated there are 9,271 state-provided schools, which have a roster of nearly four million pupils; whilst there are 11,413 voluntary or non-provided schools accommodating nearly two million pupils. The State schools, however, are for the most part in the large industrial centres, whereas throughout the rural districts. This means, of course, that the majority of children at day-school are getting no religious instruction whatsoever, and so far as they are concerned, the responsibility is upon home training or upon the efforts made elsewhere. It would be a comforting assurance to know that the youngsters receive sufficient moral instruction for their needs during the usual half-hour spent in Sunday-school, or that they attend in sufficient numbers to answer the full purpose. But nobody can pretend this is the case. There is a morbid sensibility against introducing any element of religious instruction in the week-day educational code. On the other hand, it is fairly and reasonably urged that church schools of all denominations are barriers against licence and excess, and the formation of children's characters is by far the most important part of their education. It cannot be left out of account, and the agency whereby the element of moral truth and character-building are imparted is secondary to the urgent need of its being done. All thoughtful persons will agree that the instruction which enables and persuades the youthful mind to do the things most excellent is to a large place in our modern educational system.
