CANADA'S NEW MARKET.

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Sept. 16.—"We want a larger market and that market is in the United States" was the statement made by Sir Wilfred Laurier and Hon. Rudolph Lemieux, who, with their friends from Montreal and elsewhere, held a demonstration at St. Cl. in the county of Soulanges. Reciprocity was in the air, while the devices were "Down with the trusts and the larger markets." Sir Wilfred told his hearers that Canada had 250 million bushels of grain to export and as the time would come when England could not take this surplus, a market must be found elsewhere. His government had offered a market to the present rulers of Canada who were responsible for the peoples refusal and must find a substitute which he intimated was to the south of us.

Did you ever think that every time you say "I can't" you weaken your confidence in yourself and your power to do things? Confidence is the greatest factor in achievement. CAPTAIN BARTLETT IN NEWFOUNDLAND.

(Canadian Press) ST. JOHN'S, N. F., Sept. 16.—Capt. Bartlett of the steamer Neptune who went gold hunting in Newfoundland is here. He reports the discovery of extensive coal deposits but no gold.

The steamer Algerine of the expedition was crushed in the ice and lost. The crew walked forty miles over the ice and found a cache left by Capt. Bernier. For two weeks they lived on four crackers each a day while they walked their way to Bulton Point where the Neptune picked them up.

TORNADO VISITS TOWN.

(Canadian Press) SYRACUSE, Sept. 16.—Three persons were killed and fifty injured by a tornado which wrecked a ten mile train of destruction across the Northern part of Onondaga county late yesterday afternoon.

The property loss is estimated at \$250,000.

The dead are William Madison, Syracuse and J. Dopp, Fulton, Charles Chapman, Salina.
Without any warning of its approach a black funnel shaped cloud first appeared near Long Branch, a pleasure resort 10 miles from this city. There were about 400 persons there and panic reigned when building after building toppled over and two massive interurban trolley cars were hurled into a ditch. A number ran into the dance hall for shelter but this building was directly in the path of the storm and was demolished. Many persons were injured in it. The thunder, lightning and rain were terrific.

PANAMA CANAL.

(Canadian Press) WASHINGTON, Sept. 16.—The Panama Canal is to be opened to traffic in the fall of 1913.
This statement was made officially at the navy department Saturday with an announcement that the Atlantic fleet would be rendezvoused along the coast before the water is turned in. The navy estimate is based upon the latest report from the army engineers.

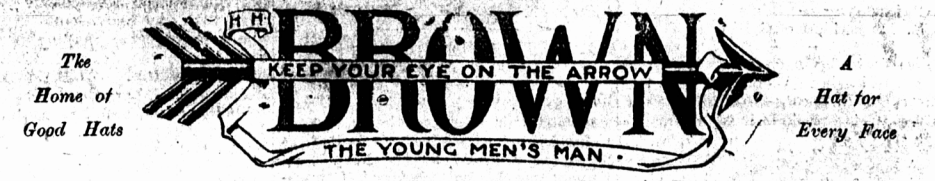

SPORTING NEWS.

(Canadian Press) SYDNEY, N. S. W., Sept. 16.—The Australian heavy-weight boxer named Sanders out-pointed Jack Sullivan, an American pugilist, in a scheduled twenty round contest at the Stadium here Saturday. Sullivan was being badly punished and the police stopped the bout in the eighteenth round.

WINNIPEG VOTES.

(Canadian Press) WINNIPEG, Sept. 16.—Winnipeg Saturday voted to appropriate a million and a half for new exhibition grounds and public baths and the improvement of the civic electric plant and defeated a by-law of \$1,800,000 for improved water system.

BANQUET GIVEN TO HON. L. P. PELLETIER.

QUEBEC, September 15.—The banquet given to the Hon. L. P. Pelletier, postmaster-general, by the mayor of Levis and the conservatives of the county on Saturday night, was one of the most successful given to a public man in this district. The banquet was attended by some 275 guests. Two of the postmaster-general's fellow cabinet members were present, Hon. Dr. Ried and Hon. J.D. Hazen, the banquet being presided over by Mayor Bernier, of Levis.

Mayor Bernier, in proposing the health of the guest of the evening, paid him a high tribute. The reception, he said, which had been tendered to Messrs. Borden and Pelletier by the citizens of Quebec had been couched at all points until Ottawa had been reached. "It was now" the turn of Levis to offer a reception to the minister of the district of Quebec and his honorable colleagues. The banquet was a desire to show their confidence in Mr. Pelletier, who had rightly won his place in the Borden cabinet, not alone by his talents, but by his past arduous work for the party.

CANADIAN BOY'S PLUCK.

MONTREAL, September 15.—Hurrying on his bicycle to get to work, Ernest Chevalier, a young lad, residing on Sagunet street, collided with a street car at the corner of Ontario and St. Denis streets this morning. The little fellow was pinned down under the car. When it was first lifted it slipped from the jack and fell back again on the boy. Chevalier stood the agony. He suffered with spartan pluck and repeatedly asked that his mother be not told of the accident.
