TO WITHHOLD COTTON CROP

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 31.—The farmers of the South will withhold from the market every remaining bale of the present season's crop of cotton and follow this with a binding agreement to reduce next season's cotton acreage at least 25 per cent if they accept the plan adopted by the conference of Southern Governors at its concluding session today.

As a means of providing permanent relief and to guarantee the cotton-farmer in future against the necessities of glutting the market with his supplies in the opening of the season, the conference adopted resolutions favoring the establishment in every cotton-growing State of State-controlled warehouses and the collection and periodical publication of statistics bearing upon the world's demand for and consumption of American cotton.

STEAMER FOUNDERED

LAS PALMAS, Canary Islands, Nov. 1.—The French steamer Didiabank sank at sea and 24 persons were drowned. The Didiabank was towing the French steamer Liberia for Marseilles when the latter fouled her, tearing the hole that caused her to founder.

SEEK CLEMENCY FOR CONDEMNED WOMAN

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.—Unless President Taft or death intervenes, there will be a woman hanged in the district of Columbia November 20, the sentence of Mattie Lomax, a negro, condemned to die for murdering her husband. A petition bearing 50,000 names has been presented to the president asking clemency for the woman. The prisoner is now critically ill and may not live to see the day set for her execution.

DESTRUCTIVE EXPLOSION

PATTERSON, N. J., Nov. 1.—Explosions at the Dupont Powder Works at Haskell early today, caused a loss of about \$60,000 and endangered the lives of about thirty men at the plant. Only a few were seriously injured. The explosion destroyed three of the buildings containing valuable machinery and finished products.
