CUMULATIVE LEAVE URGED FOR TEACHERS

TORONTO April 7.—Teachers are likely to receive a reward for concession of cumulative sick leave a matter which has been discussed by teachers not only in Toronto but throughout the whole province for many years.

At the present time the department of education of the province gives a statutory allowance of four weeks during a year for illness, a teacher to receive full pay during that time.

In view of the fact that many teachers are not absent from school through illness over a period of years and that this close attention to their duties has a direct bearing on their own efficiency and that of the school, it was felt advisable that those teachers who did not take advantage of that statutory allowance should be granted some tangible recognition for their services.

Various phases of the discussion revealed the following facts: Under the present system there is a natural tendency for a teacher to take the full allowance of time each year.

Trustee F. B. Edmunds noted that this was not done in Toronto. Teachers were absent about six and a half days a year on the average. But if the number of days of absence could be lowered to about four, an expenditure of \$55,000 would be saved.
