THE San Juan Prospector of Del Norte, Colorado, of June 21st says:—Receiver Peter F. Barclay, about 3 o'clock last Wednesday morning, was stricken with paralysis, and managed to crawl from his room in the U. S. Land Office, across the street, and awaken the Weiss Brothers, who came to his assistance, placed him in bed and sent for Mrs. Barclay, who was at the ranch on Pinos Creek. The stroke was a severe one, and the wonder is that Mr. Barclay was able to get out of his room at all. Mr. Barclay seemed to be getting along nicely and expected to be at his office in the afternoon, when at about 1.30 p. m. a second attack struck his heart and he was dead before those at his bedside could realize it. The funeral took place Thursday under Masonic auspices and was largely attended, the Knights of Pythias forming an escort. Peter F. Barclay was a native of Prince Edward Island, was 57 years of age and had been a resident of Colorado since the early days around Central City, coming to Del Norte in the first San Juan excitement in the early seventies. He was well known all over the State and was liked by all. He leaves a wife and one daughter, Mrs. Jack Warr, of his immediate family. Going further into detail, Peter F. Barclay came to Colorado in 1839, was married at Central City in 1871. He came to Del Norte in 1873. He was born in 1843 and was 57 years old. One brother survives him, living in Prince Edward Island. The sudden death of Peter F. Barclay was a great shock to the entire community, his many good qualities having won for him a place in the hearts of all. Peace to his ashes. (The deceased was a brother of James Barclay, Esq., O'Leary station.)

Sabbath Desecration.

SIR,—People who have always been taught to "remember the Sabbath Day to keep it holy," must have been shocked on Sunday to visit some of the wharves of his city and see how it was being observed here.

To be plain, let me call the attention of the authorities to what was taking place. The first wharf visited was that of Messrs. Poole & Lewis to which the Plan Line steamer Olivette was tied. Here could be seen a number of boys with complete fishing gear, catching smelts, or whatever might take the baited hook. As the Olivette was approached a stage was seen, put out over the side of this wharf, welcome steamer and very soon men with paint and brushes descended and began the work of painting on her hull.

The next wharf visited was the Connolly Wharf where the S. S. Greetinglands lay, and here we noticed a case worthy of the attention of the Society of Prevention of Cruelty to Animals if we have such a society. The forward deck of this steamer was literally crowded with cattle and the state some of those poor dumb animals were in was pitiable. They were tied as close together as possible and one could not but see the state of perspiration, panting, etc., and a hot sun shining down on them with no covering that they did not get that sufficient quantity of fresh air that nature demanded.

Again in the afternoon the tug Wm. Aitken (which I understand left Pictou in the morning) steamed into port with a barge in tow and to see the crowd of men, women and children on the wharf to meet her on arrival and examine the machinery on board the barge, one could not but recall his recollections and wonder, is this surely the Sabbath day? This no doubt is a busy world, but as God has given us six days for work I think the good people of Charlottetown should see to it that the Sabbath in future is more strictly observed, especially around our wharves.
