**FEAR DIPHTHERIA**—Quarantine was imposed Monday on the military training camp in Yarmouth, N. S., because of a possible case of diphtheria among the 500 men here under the compulsory training scheme. Col. U. G. Dawson of Charlottetown, camp commandant, said the measure was purely precautionary. Meanwhile, quarantine at the Royal Canadian Air Force barracks has been lifted. The fliers had been confined for 10 days following discovery of a mild diphtheria case.

After the ceremony the happy couple left for a trip to Upper Canada and on their return they will take up residence at 29 1/2 Cameron Street, Dartmouth, Nova Scotia.—Halifax Herald.

Charlie Isaac is a private in the Canadian army now, but up in the Yukon country he is still Chief of the Moosech Indian band.

Chief Charlie is a short, wiry red-man who is looking forward to action overseas. He was one of a large group of Yukoners, many of them southerners from the gold creeks, who came down from the north to enlist.

"I've been chief for quite a while," says Chief Charlie, who is only 28. "But I'm too young to stay at home and let the others do the fighting. If I'm lucky enough to get back the old job of chief will be waiting for me."

The Indian speaks perfect English. He was educated at the Anglican church mission near Dawson. He is a thoroughly modern Indian. When at home he spends most of his time driving a truck.

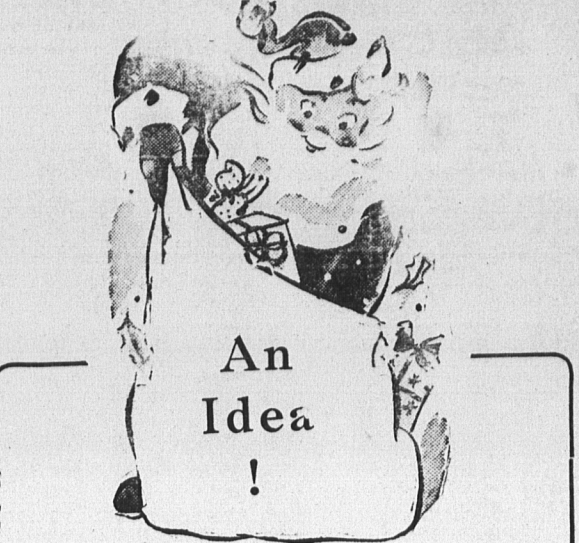

**MONTREAL, Dec. 11 (CP)**—The Dominion Livestock Branch reported today there were 25 cattle, 53 sheep and lambs, 173 hogs and 213 calves for sale on the two Montreal livestock markets.

Prices on all classes of livestock were steady.

A few good light steers brought \$8.50 to \$9. Good butcher cows sold up to \$6.75. Canners and cutters \$2.75 to \$4.50.

Veal calves ranged from \$9.50 to \$11.50. Grassers made the bulk of the offerings and brought \$4.75 to \$6, mostly \$5.

Lambs were sold on a flat basis at 80 per hundredweight. Sheep were \$4 to \$6.

Hogs were \$11.15 to \$11.25 for B-1 dressed and up to \$9.50 for B-1 alive off trucks. Grade "A" drew \$1 per hog premium with discounts on off grades. Sows were \$5.50 to \$6.

On Maritime markets, rail grade hogs \$10.90, rail grade sows number one up to 270 pounds, \$7, number one over 270 pounds, \$6, number 2 all weights \$5.
