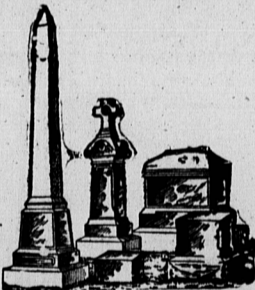

The ceremony was performed by Rev. Morgan E. Genge, D. D., pastor of the church, in the presence of immediate relatives and invited guests.

The bride who was given away by her father, wore a handsome travelling suit of blue broadcloth with black fox collar. Her hat was of black velvet, poke shape, and she carried a bouquet of white roses.

The bridesmaid was Miss Ina McMillan. She was becomingly attired in grey Canton crepe with black hat, and carried a bouquet of pink sweet peas.

The church was beautifully decorated for the joyous event with autumn leaves, ferns, sweet peas and asters.
