LIFE INSURANCE LOAN SUBSCRIBERS

MONTREAL, March 12—Life insurance companies operating in the Dominion subscribed over 135 million dollars to the Victory Loan. The Canadian, British and United States life insurance companies in Canada have been the largest single subscribers to each one of the Dominion's War Loans. Today their war loan investments exceed the total increase in their assets in Canada since the war began.

In an interview today, Mr. G. W. Bourke of Montreal, President of The Canadian Life Insurance Officers' Association, pointed out that the grand total now subscribed by the companies to help finance the purchase of tanks, planes, ships, guns, munitions and equipment for Canada's fighting services, approximates 300 million dollars.

The war service of the life insurance companies is not to be measured in dollars alone. In this last Victory Loan campaign, as in the one that preceded it, life insurance companies made their entire sales forces available to the Government. Apart from the War Loan life insurance managers and executives have undertaken very important work in the sale of War Savings stamps and certificates.

"In war loan subscriptions, as in all war work," Mr. Bourke concluded, "our member companies have striven to reflect the patriotic impulses of their millions of policyholders throughout Canada. It is actually their premium dollars that have become fighting dollars on active service."

SUGGESTIONS GIVEN FOR ATTRACTIVE DECORATIVE EFFECTS.—Colored lighting, used so spectacularly on the stage, is moving into the home. Here it may paint moonlight or a sunset through an artificial window in the dining room, bathe the curtains of a long living room window or shine through a framed square of etched glass to make a breath-taking picture of light. But there is little chance that colored lighting will ever be used in the home except for decorative effects. Electric lighting that approximates in color the light found out of doors in the daytime is much more natural to live with. It is also of course much easier to read by, when used in abundance, than colored lights would be. In homes that have studio type living-rooms with high vaulted ceilings sloping to the ridge-pole colored lights can be effectively used. For instance a dummy window may be illuminated with a soft shade of light blue or green to enhance the perspective.

HANDLE WITH CARE

As the theme song in many stores dealing in kitchen utensils may soon become: "That's all there is, there isn't any more!" it becomes important that housewives take exceptionally good care of their belongings.

Then, too it is essential that as soon as any metal utensil becomes unserviceable, it be turned over to the salvage collector.

Here are some pointers in the use and care of cooking equipment:

Aluminum: This, the most satisfactory of materials is now irreplaceable. Clean with mild soap and finest abrasive. A stain inside that will not yield to scouring can usually be removed by boiling vinegar and water in the pan. Never use an alkaline solution, such as soda, as this corrodes the metal.

Enamelware: Treat with great care as the surface is only too easily cracked or chipped. Never allow to boil dry, and cool before washing. Do not pour cold water into a hot pan. Food that has stuck to the bottom must be scraped with anything sharper than a wooden clothes pin. Scapy water boiled in the pan will loosen obstinate burns.

Heatproof Glass and Earthenware: These utensils retain the heat for a very long time and actually go on cooking after they are removed from the range. Take great care that they do not come into contact with cold water while they are still hot. Even a small wet patch on table or draining board may cause a break.

Wash with hot water and alkaline soap and dry very thoroughly.

Iron Cooking Utensils: These are excellent for long slow cooking, and for frying pans and griddles. They should be seasoned before use, by coating some non-salty fat in them for 2-3 hours at a low temperature. This makes them more resistant to rust. For the same reason dry carefully after washing with very hot water and allow to rust. It is better not to make any attempt to keep tinware

Gibraltar's 'Tunn erllers'

The "Tunn erllers" wear T-inscribed berets to keep out dust. A private of the King's Regiment guards a tunnel entrance.

Lighting fuses to blast a wall

Deep down in the great rock of Gibraltar, the "Tunn erllers" of the Royal Engineers dig, blast and scrape mammoth caves to be used as air-raid shelters, hospitals and storage rooms and for other military purposes beneath Britain's mighty stronghold at the western entrance to the Mediterranean. These "Tunn erllers" are recruited entirely among miners and quarry workers
