Presbyterians Honor Memory of Dr. Johnston

OTTAWA, Oct. 30th. - Tributes to the memory of Very Reverend Dr. Robert Johnston, recently-retired minister of Knox Presbyterian Church who died Friday night in Halifax, were paid in Presbyterian churches throughout Ottawa area at Sunday services. From every pulpit came expressions of the sorrow felt by Presbyterians in the loss of a man who for 25 years played a leading part in the affairs of their church in the Capital and throughout Canada.

At Knox Church, where Dr. Johnston occupied the pulpit for a quarter of a century prior to his retirement at the end of last August, Rev. Dr. George H. Donald of Montreal voiced the keen regret with which word of Dr. Johnston's death was received by the congregation.

"In my long experience, I have not known a minister more beloved than he by his people, by his friends and acquaintances and by the church he served with such distinction and faithfulness.

"Honors crowded in upon him, but he still remained that sincere and devoted minister you know and revered. . . . He was one of those men in whom God created a clean heart and a right spirit, a happy, glowing spirit.

Speaking of Dr. Johnston's contribution to the Presbyterian Church during his term as moderator of the General Assembly, Dr. Donald said:

"Our General Assembly never had a more resolute and gifted moderator. He was a resourceful speaker with a wide knowledge of the affairs of the church, and he guided debates with a courtesy and firmness that was unique."

It was announced that a special memorial service honoring Dr. Johnston's memory will be held next Sunday morning at Knox Church, conducted by Rev. W. A. Cameron of Toronto. Dr. Cameron is secretary of the Board of Missions, of which Dr. Johnston was convener.

In the other Presbyterian churches, words of tribute were spoken and special prayers offered.

Rev. Robert Good, minister of the Eskine Presbyterian Church, recalled his close association with Dr. Johnston. As a past moderator of the Synod, he had worked in close co-operation with him and also been associated with him in church affairs in the Maritime provinces.

Rev. Mr. Good keenly regretted that he would be unable to attend the funeral of Dr. Johnston today, since he was to be officiating at a service elsewhere.

At St. Giles Church, Rev. H. M. Kerr, associate minister of Parkdale Presbyterian Church, Toronto, conducted prayers for Dr. Johnston in the absence of the minister, Rev. Logan-Veneta, who was in Toronto.

T.C.A. SPEEDS FRESH FOOD TO GREAT BRITAIN

MONCTON, October 28 - The first shipment of gift food parcels under Trans-Canada Air Lines new tariff rates recently left Montreal for the United Kingdom aboard one of the large North Star Skyliners.
