THE PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.

The ninth annual Convention of the P. E. Island Sunday School Association will be held in Charlottetown, Monday and Tuesday, Oct. 20, 21, 1922. The first session opens at eleven o'clock Monday morning probably in the First Methodist Church.

DELEGATES.

All pastors, superintendents and members of the Executive Committee are members, ex-officio, of the Convention. Each school is entitled to send two delegates, not including the Superintendent, and one additional delegate if the membership of the school is more than one hundred. Every Superintendent is urged to see that his school is represented.

ENTERTAINMENT.

All delegates will be entertained by the kindness of the citizens of Charlottetown, provided their names are forwarded to Colonel F. S. Moore, chairman of entertainment committee, previous to October 17th. If the delegates, whose names have been forwarded, find they cannot attend they should promptly notify Colonel Moore so as to prevent disappointment to families providing entertainment.

On arriving in Charlottetown all delegates are requested to proceed to the First Methodist Church to register and to be directed to homes.

TRAVELLING ARRANGEMENTS.

Every one going to the Convention via the P. E. Island Railway will purchase a ticket at single first class fare to Charlottetown. Be sure to state, when purchasing your ticket that you are going

attend the Sunday School Convention. You will keep this ticket for the return trip, which when presented to the conductor with a certificate of attendance given at the Convention, will procure for you a free return trip good to October 24th.

PROGRAM.

A good program, consisting of addresses and conferences on practical Sunday School questions is being prepared. Mr. Marion Lawrence of Toledo, Ohio, International Field Secretary, will be present. Those who heard Mr. Lawrence last year know that his presence will ensure a profitable Convention. Prof. E. O. Excell of Chicago, widely known as a singer, writer and publisher of sacred music, will also be present. Prof. Excell conducted the singing at the International Convention in Denver this summer and it will be a great treat to have him at our Convention. Normal Diplomas will be presented to about sixty graduates.

Superintendents are urged to reply promptly to the District Secretaries, who have sent out blank forms to all schools asking for full statistics and an offering for our Provincial work. If your school has not received a blank form for reporting, kindly notify the Field Secretary at once.

All meetings of the Convention are open to the public.

SPLIT IN CANADIAN LABOR CIRCLES.

An Effort Being Made to Crush Out Some of the Canadian Organizations—A Flutter of Excitement Caused in Labor Circles Over Canada.

An Ontario Exchange says: Quite a flutter of excitement has been caused in labor circles all over the Dominion by the recent action of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada at its annual meeting at Berlin.

The national or Canadian bodies have up to the present been recognized as genuine labor organizations, and admitted to the Trades and Labor Congress which body in some instances gave them being through the charter issued by its officers, and have also been admitted to the local Trades Councils.

Recently the American Federation of Labor has displayed great activity in the Dominion, especially in the eastern provinces, and there has been more or less friction in consequence. A number of the locals chartered by it have refused to recognize the Canadian congress. These local organizations have also organized Trades Councils, and in at least one instance at Charlottetown, P. E. I., the council so formed has refused to recognize a local labor organization holding a charter from the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada. The executive of that province reported to congress, protesting against Trades Councils being chartered by outside bodies.

By the action of the Trades Congress at Berlin all these purely

Canadian bodies in trades where international organizations exist are refused recognition as genuine labor organizations, even although in some cases at all events, they were the pioneer organizations in Canada. This policy was adopted by the majority, composed of representatives of international organizations, in an endeavor apparently to crush out the Canadian organizations as such or to force them to identify themselves with the international organizations.

Many of the advocates of the change contended that the clause of the constitution excluding these bodies from the congress also applies to the local Trades and Labor Councils. If this contention be upheld by the councils it will in almost every city and town result in the exclusion of organizations which have hitherto been recognized as members.

In Toronto the Longshoremen's Union may be taken as an illustration. Owing to local conditions this union contends it cannot with advantage affiliate with the International Longshoremen's Union or with the freight Handlers' organization in the west. A movement is on foot to exclude this union from the Toronto Trades Council, together with other local organizations coming under the ban of the congress.

It is impossible to understand why there should be so much secrecy and mystery. Every circumstance connected with the affair is suspicious. I have been told that some of the statements made by the promoters in the beginning of the negotiations with the Government were subsequently found to be untrue. This fact of itself should have been sufficient to put the Government on its guard, but I'm afraid it was not.

As you say the Board of Trade representing as it does, the business interests of the Province should take the matter up and public opinion strong enough to compel the Government to tell the people what they are doing should be formed.

The present in my opinion is a time for plain speaking and prompt action, or the consequences may be serious.
