The pitcher and catcher of the Souris team are dandies. WINNIPEG, August 31—Two resolutions of more than ordinary importance to eastern Canada were passed by the British Scientists this morning. One recommended that Manitoba government offer a bounty for extermination of rats, and the other was in regard to the disappearance of salmon in British Columbia; the federal authorities being asked to appoint a committee of investigation. Prof. Shipley, head of the Zoological department, moved the former resolution. He thought that the invasion of the province by rats was a matter of greatest importance to the wheat industry. If allowed to spread, they would destroy 25 per cent. yield annually. Most determined steps should be taken to exterminate these pests, who have made their appearance from the south. As for salmon, the scientists feared that a few years will see their complete disappearance unless steps were taken at once, and to prevent it, a commission should start work immediately. TRIED TO DROWN HIMSELF. WHILE CRAZED WITH DRINK. ROUNDED UP LIQUOR SELLERS TORONTO, Aug. 31—The Ontario license department is making a clean up of places in the Cobalt district selling liquor illegally. Sixteen convictions within the past few days have resulted in payment of \$1,150 in fines and there are several cases yet to be disposed of. One man was sentenced to three months in jail for tampering with a witness. At least two hundred barrels of beer were confiscated and samples of it are now being analyzed. At Matheson the detective collared twenty cases of beer and two barrels of whiskey. All sorts of dodges are resorted to at Laford, in order to ship beer to Groulx and up the Montreal river in a way that it will not be detected. Bottles of the prohibited liquor are carried in gasoline cans and barrels. Innocent looking cases of provisions are also cases of whiskey. According to one of the discharged guards other employees at the penitentiary are implicated. The whiskey was made from pruned juice, yeast and sugar.

EX-CHIEF JUSTICE SIR S H STRONG DEAD

OTTAWA, Aug. 31—Right Hon. Sir Samuel Henry Strong, ex-Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Canada, died tonight after a lingering illness at his residence, on Queen Street, Ottawa. He was eighty-four years of age and retired on superannuation from the Chief Justiceship in November, 1902. He was a native of Dorsetshire, England, coming to Quebec in 1836 with his father, who was Chaplain to the British forces at the Citadel. He studied law in Bytown, now Ottawa, and was called to the bar in 1849. In 1869 he was appointed to the Chancery Division of the Ontario High Court, and in 1875 was appointed to the newly constituted Supreme Court Bench at Ottawa. In 1892 he succeeded Sir William Ritchie, as Chief Justice of Canada. In the following year he was knighted, and in 1897 he was made a member of the Judicial Committee of the Imperial Privy Council. He is survived by his widow, Lady Strong.
