The latest news, first of all.

Mrs. S. C. Moore, City, is visiting in Halifax.

Miss Florence Stretch has returned to Montreal from a visit to her home at Long Creek.

Miss Burgess of England is expected in this City tonight to visit her sister Mrs. (Prof.) Wright, Brighton.

The city market was not up to its usual standard yesterday due to the inclement weather. The produce market was very light practically none being produced for sale. The inside market was also dull and quotations remained the same as last market day. The pork market is steady.

Among the many building improvements in this city none is more marked than that of the Morell House, City, of which William Seller is the proprietor. It is most noticeable from the fact that it is the addition of a magnificent balcony, which extends along the entire street front of the building. The change is a marked one, the Morell House front being so different as to almost suggest a new building. A string of electric lights adds still further to the attractiveness of the front after the light of day has flown. The Morell is exceptionally popular with its hundreds of patrons from town and country.

In Chancery, before the Vice Chancellor, Chiverie vs. McIsaac and others. This was a suit brought for partition and sale of 50 acres of land in Lots 45 and 46 formerly owned by Peter Cheverie. The complainants heirs-at-law of Peter Cheverie claimed a share in the land over which the Elmira Branch Railway is being built. One of the defendants Edward A. Paquet, claimed the land absolutely under a documentary title and possession of his predecessors for over 40 years. The Court held that the defendant Paquet had made out a good prima facie case, as the absolute owner of the land and held that he could not at present decree a partition. The judgment of the Court was that the suit stand over for one year to enable the complainants to bring action in a court of common law to establish any title they might have to the property. If they do not do so within a year the bill will be dismissed. McDonald, Fraser and McQuaid for complainants, Johnson, K. C., and McCallum for defendants. Elizabeth Duffy and others vs. John A. Blatherson and Aeneas A. McDonald. This is a suit brought to declare an absolute deed given by the late Edward J. Duffy to the defendants to be a mortgage with the right of redemption upon payment of the amount due under the deed not exceeding \$350. The defendants claim the sum of \$910 or thereabouts as due to them for advances and costs incurred. The defendants demurred to the complainants' bill on the ground that the bill showed no equity. The demurrer was overruled. Bentley for defendants, Johnson K. C. for complainants.

Mrs. George Lydford of New York arrived in this City Wednesday night. She will spend two weeks with her parents John and Mrs. Walker of North River, returning to New York accompanied by her two little girls, Misses Elva and Rita Lydford.

At the Police Court in this city yesterday Dobson and the two Lodgers, charged with theft from stores in Stanley Bridge, were sent up to the Supreme Court for trial. Supreme Court meets on the second Tuesday in January. There were no other cases before the court.

At the recent meeting of the Royal Society of Canada held in Ottawa a paper by N. R. Gillis, B. A., M. Sc., lecturer in the Physics at McGill University, on Water Vapour Lines in the Sun's Spectrum, was presented by Dr. H. H. Barnes. Gillis comes from this Province and had a brilliant career as a student at McGill University.

Commencing on October 10th a change in the P. E. I. R. timetable will be made which will affect the morning service between Charlottetown, Souris and Georgetown. The train formerly leaving Souris at five thirty a. m. will now leave at six thirty arriving here at nine forty-five instead of eight fifteen. The Georgetown train which connects at Mt Stewart will be one hour later now leaving Georgetown in the morning at 6.20.

One of the breeziest descriptive articles of the season appears in the Canadian Magazine for October under the title Calgary: A Study in Optimism. The author is Miss Jane Pratt, a writer whose name is not as yet very generally known. While it gives some impression of Calgary in a commercial way, its chief charm is in the naive manner in which an insight is given into the daily life and spirit of the people of this city of the foothills. A more serious article is contributed by Stuart Jenkins, and entitled Is the Old Roman Race Still Dominant? in which the author claims for the people of Great Britain a perpetuation of the Roman type that once dominated the whole world. Damascus the Temptress is the title of a fine travel article by A. R. Carman, and The Continuity of Municipal Policy is a well-thought-out consideration of local government. Frank E. Newton gives a good account of the domain in Northern Ontario, in which he predicts an important future for that part of the Province. The last act of Arthur Stringer's fascinating drama The Blot appears in this number, as well as several other good articles and a number of absorbing stories and sketches.
