

**LOCAL BRIEFS NARROW**

Regular monthly meeting School Board to-night.

The S.S. Halifax is due at midnight and sails at one o'clock tomorrow.

The express arrived in the city at a quarter to twelve on Saturday night.

Rev. A. L. Goggie is to be inducted in Toronto on Nov. 7th. Rev. Armstrong Black preaches the induction sermon.

The S. S. City of Ghent arrived in port shortly after two o'clock yesterday from Summerside, she having called there prior to coming to this port.

Saturday night's gale did considerable damage throughout the country. In some sections large trees were blown down and some of the wires broken.

CAPT. JOHN McPHERSON, 1st officer of the Minto, has taken a house on King St., and is moving his furniture to the city.

A TELEPHONE message on Saturday evening stated that the funeral of the late Miss Martin, of Alberton, would take place on Sunday afternoon.

On Saturday morning two drunks came before His Honor. They were Peter Campbell and Frank Weatherbie. Campbell was fined \$2 or 10 days and Weatherbie \$5 or 30 days.

At Souris, on Thursday, Nov. 2nd, before Stipendiary Blanchard, Prosecutor Bears obtained a conviction for violation of the C. T. Act against Ephraim McKenzie of Souris, and he was fined fifty dollars and costs. A case against R. F. McDonald was dismissed for want of evidence.

W. A. McCALLUM, formerly of Lot 48, P. E. I., but now of Minburne, Iowa, has just taken 197 young cattle from the island to his western farm. He has 10,000 bushels surplus of corn for feed, and could not get cattle near his home. Corn is a great crop, while cattle for feeding purposes are scarce and high.—Pictou Advocate.

"Events"—is the name of a new paper issued from Campbellton, N. B. It contains a cut of the handsome church, St. Andrews, of which the Rev. A. F. Carr, of Alberton, P. E. I., is pastor. Mr. Carr is the sixth pastor. On the 1st day of October, 1889, he was inducted, and on the 1st day of Oct. 1899, the tenth anniversary of his pastorate was celebrated.—Colchester Sun.

The town of Montague will soon be classed with the modern cities of the day. The posts that will convey the wires for lighting of the town have all been placed in position and a very large number of the houses of Montague have been wired ready for the turning on of the light. Three hundred lights have already been placed and it is expected that many more will be allotted during the month of November. The dynamo which has been ordered will carry about 400 lights and will arrive shortly. The power house will be at McDonald's mill about a mile from Montague where the dynamo will be driven by water power.

The body of Mrs. William Smith, of Northport, N. S., who disappeared recently in her night clothes, has been found on the shore at Port Howe. She had evidently walked straight from her bed to the shore, a short distance, and drowned herself, and the tide and wind carried the body to where it was found. A husband and large family of small children are left behind. This is the second drowning out of the same house, a young man who had charge of the place, being drowned a year ago. Mrs. Smith was about 50 years of age, and was a Miss Collins, of P. E. Island.—Pictou Advocate.

**ESCAPE**

**Mr. Henry Hine Rendered Unconscious.**

**HAND BADLY BURNED**

**Rescued by Mr. Alex. McCannell Who Happened to be Passing by.**

AN accident happened yesterday afternoon about half past four o'clock, which fell but little short of being fatal to Mr. Henry Hine, sexton of St. Peter's Cathedral, who seeing an electric light wire which had been loosened from its position and hanging so low over the street behind the church as to threaten the safety of persons passing in carriages, seized it with the intention of placing it out of harm's way.

The insulating covering of the wire had evidently been scraped off by friction against a tree, for as Mr. Hine grasped it he received a terrific shock from the current passing along the wire at the time, and was thrown violently to the ground against which he was repeatedly knocked.

Mr. James McEachern, who happened to be on the spot, attempted to extricate Mr. Hine had received one or two shocks from the electric current. Mr. Alex. McCannell after several attempts succeeded in knocking the wire away from Mr. Hine's hand with a stick and thereby saved his life.

Mr. Hine's face is very much scratched, two of his fingers are burned almost into the bones and he is much shocked by the accident which so nearly proved fatal.

**DEAF AND DUMB INSTITUTE.**

A Free Education Offered to the Poor Children of P. E. Island.

The Fredericton Institution for the Education of the Deaf offers exceptional advantages in the way of health, training, supervision and kindly home influences. Old Government House has been converted into an institution for this purpose.

This stately and historic building is beautifully situated on the right bank of the St. John River, a short distance to the north of the city. Its spacious grounds laid out in lawns, flower beds, summer houses and with magnificent shrub trees extend to the river bank and the other side of the house faces Wilmot Park the noble gift to the city of the late Mr. Edward Wilmot.

A healthy location is essential to the well-being of the deaf and the less they are crowded in large institutions or in communities the better it is for them.

Every institution which has for its object the education of the deaf should be away from the midst of narrow and thickly populated streets.

The advanced thought of the present age seeking the best interests of the deaf, points to the time when large institutions will be superseded by smaller schools in different localities and where more home like privileges can be provided for them. There is no class of children that needs more individual care and attention from the teachers both in school and out. The Fredericton Institution aims to be a school of this kind and offers a good and comfortable home where every care is taken of its pupils in addition to the best training that can be given.

A specialty is made of lip reading and articulation and its work in this respect will compare favorably with that of any institution in Canada. The parents of deaf children who seek refined home like privileges for their children will find the Fredericton Institution all they desire.

The children of poor parents throughout the Island are offered an education with board free. The names of uneducated deaf children will be gladly received by Mr. George E. Powers, Hotel Ross, Summerside, or by Principal Woodbridge, at the Institution, Fredericton.
