HAPPY FIFTHS DEFEAT HALIGONIANS

Gr. Roy Macdonald Of The 272nd Battery Tells How The Happy Fifth Spent Christmas And Gives a Graphic Account of a Baseball Game in Which The Battery Defeated Halifax On Boxing Day

Camp, Dec. 26, 1916. Sir,—All the boys are fine excepting those who are in the different hospitals, and they are coming along as well as can be expected.

Our Christmas here was as enjoyable as we possibly could make it, under the circumstances. There were the usual church parades, as on Sunday, after which those who had charge of the dinners started their preparations, and it was up to them in the sections in which the spread was to take place, to shift their quarters for the time being.

but a slight fog prevailed and the field was not being in good condition, had tendency to make good ball playing impossible in many cases.

The first man to bat, Steeves put down in quick order, the next man walked, but was put out at second, and the following one, was out on three strikes. Then the 272nd team came to bat and got two runs, two in one, two, three order, which was not at all to the boys' liking, but they once more took the field. I, the first man up for the 273rd team, smashed a beauty out to right field, which looked good for a home run, but our Serg. Major, who was out, succeeded in stopping him at third. The next man up made a sacrifice hit, and was put out at first, and Baker on third reached the home plate in safety, making the score 1-0, in favor of the 273rd team. The next two men up, fanned and the side was retired. The 272nd came again to bat, but as in the first were again put down, without anyone reaching first. This was making things look brighter for the 273rd, and they came to bat very confident of adding a few more to their count, but Steeves made up his mind that nothing like this was going to happen. He fanned the three of them, and the side was retired in the shortest inning of the game.

This time the 272nd came to bat with two in their order. The next man to bat, with two strikes on him, the pitcher thought he would give him a high one, but it was higher than he intended and Harry Bearisto made a terrific smash for it and started for base, reaching it in safety, before the catcher could recover the ball and throw him out at first. He was followed by Steeves, who lined a nice one out in the left field, reaching second and bringing Bearisto from first base to third. McIntosh was the next man up and smashed a nice one out, bringing Bearisto home, and reaching second, Steeves being put out at the home plate, while he was making an attempt to get the lead. Keough, the next man, was put out, first, McIntosh getting to third. Garret coming up, lined a dandy out to right field, bringing McIntosh home and reaching second. But Lieut. Murphy coming, made an unsuccessful attempt to connect with the base stop, who hit it roll between his legs, allowing Steeves to reach second. McIntosh came up again and slammed one out to centre field, bringing Steeves home, and reaching third himself on an overthrow by one of the 273rd players. This was practically the only error for this team during the day. Keough was again thrown out at first. Garret coming up to the bat, connected with the ball and sent a nice one to right field, bringing McIntosh home and reaching second. Lieut. Murphy came up and made a nice hit to the outfield, who succeeded in gathering it in and they were retired without a further score, but they added two more scores, making the score read 4-1, in favor of the 272nd.

This brought forth rounds of applause from the boys of the "Happy 5th" as they were commonly known in Charlottetown.

This left it unnecessary for the other innings to be played, so they each gave three cheers and the game ended.

After the game, "Big Chief" Gunnar Steeves and the "Battery Giant" came in for a bounce, as did Lieut. Murphy, J. Keoughan, F. McDonald, A. McKinnon, H. McIntosh, Serg. Major Lea, and Chester Garret. The umpire also came in for his spole, the boys going up to his room and carrying him down-stairs to bounce him and thus the day ended.

There is a possibility of a return match being played on a later date, providing more suitable grounds can be provided.
