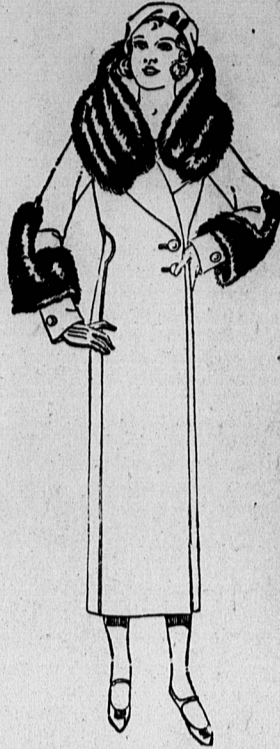

CASE DISMISSED—A case of driving a car to the common danger was tried yesterday before Mr. John Campbell, J.P., at the Court House, Summerside, and created considerable interest.
