(By the Canadian Press)—Nova Scotia and New Brunswick highway officials conferred here yesterday on plans to make uniform several regulations of the two provinces but no decisions were reached and those in attendance refused to disclose information in regard to the subjects under discussion. Liquor Seizure

BOSTON, Mass., Feb. 3.—The British sixty foot power boat, Pronto, with approximately 1,200 sacks of liquor on board, was taken into custody off Cape Cod during the night by the coast-guard patrol boat Jackson. Coast guards said the craft was nine miles off the coast when she was seized.
