The Markets

(Canadian Press)

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 8.—(Eggs)—A firm situation continues on Canadian egg markets today, especially for the grade of extras.

TORONTO—Extras are firmer here today while other grades are unchanged. Prices to retailers are extras, 52-54; firsts 46-47; seconds 35-37.

MONTREAL—Receipts of eggs here today were 3,024 cases compared to 4,482 cases on the same day last year, prices are unchanged on this market with extras very scarce. A car of record storage seconds is reported sold at 25 1/2 cents F. O. B. North Battleford, Calgary, is asking 25 cents and Winnipeg 27 cents for similar cars but there is no carlot demand as yet. Brandon is asking extras 43; firsts 39; seconds 28, for a mixed car of fresh eggs Chicago spot unchanged Nov. 36%, Dec. 37%. New York spot unchanged Nov. 37%.

MONTREAL, Que., Oct. 8.—Live poultry prices were lowered to some extent on the Montreal wholesale market today but with this exception prices were again unchanged. There was heavy demand for the large arrivals of live poultry which sold from 18 to 23 cents per pound, depending on the weight, with spring chickens ranging from 18 to 26 cents per pound.

The cheese market was once more very inactive with prices holding unchanged at 19 1/2 to 20 for No. 1 Ontario cheese and 19 1/2 to 19 3/4 for Quebec.

Butter was steady and was still quoted at 38 1/2 to 39 cents per pound for No. 1 eastern townships pasteurized.

The egg section was a little more active but prices were unchanged. Potatoes were also steady.



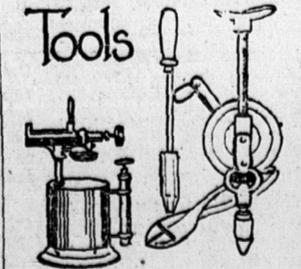

NEW YORK, Oct. 8.—Gene Tunney, retired heavyweight champion, earned \$1,715,863 in the three years since he fought Jack Dempsey at Philadelphia.
