The Chapter secured a piano for the Airport, which was gratefully acknowledged.

The Essay contest sponsored by the Chapter for Summerside High School pupils was won by Miss Betty Bruce. The contest was "British Possessions and how acquired." The prize, a book of war savings stamps, was won by Miss Betty Bruce.

The Federal Government issued war savings stamp books with the I.O.D.E. insignia for the use of members and their friends. The goal of members is a book a month.

Mrs. Perry referred to the instructive lecture of Major Ne, sponsored by the chapter.

She also referred to the part the Chapter took in donations of the Corvette, "Summerside." Also the work the Chapter is doing in providing six children at the High School with milk, clothes, shoes, homes; and in assisting to the 'Save the Children Fund,' to the Queens Fund, Blanket Fund and to the fund for Canada's war guests, Polish Relief and Prisoners of War.

Mrs. Perry spoke very highly of the untiring work of Miss Hunt, the Regent, and how the Chapter has gone forward under her guidance and leadership and also expressed her appreciation of the work of the Councillors.

Mrs. Perry referred to the appointment of Miss Agnes Ramsay as Provincial Educational Secretary, which has met with the approval of all members.

**Report of Miss Wanda Wyatt, convenor of War Services**

Miss Wyatt gave a comprehensive report of the work done during the year for War Services.

Work accomplished and purchased was knitted articles 693—leather jenkins 7—refugee garments 661—hospital ward shoes 12. Seven boxes were shipped to Commander Hubbard for the Navy and one containing khaki and Air Force comforts to I. O. D. E. headquarters.

In March, August and January boxes of refugee garments were sent to Nova Scotia Provincial chapter to be shipped overseas. 12 pair of hospital ward shoes were donated to the Red Cross and sent to hospital at No. 9 S.P.T.S.

The sharp break just behind the point of the right hand arrow of Japanese aggression on map above spells good news for the United Nations in the Dutch East Indies. An Allied attack, in which U. S. bombers and Dutch warships took part, smashed enemy invasion fleet of Bali. Only one Jap ship escaped. Size of fleet and its makeup was not announced. Meanwhile Japs continued thrusts towards eastern end of strategic Java.
