

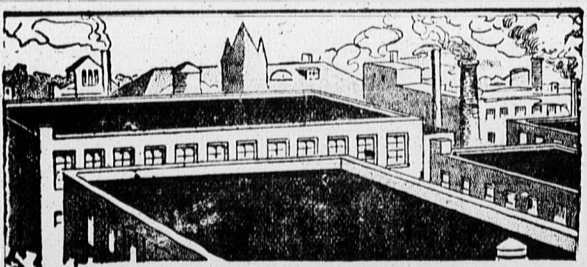

The baskets were auctioned by Mr. Neil MacCannell and brought good prices. The sum of \$70 was realized. This sum is to be used for telephone extension. Mr. T. A. Stewart presided and the best of order prevailed.

On Saturday May 15th 1920, the angel of death claimed as its victim one of the oldest and most respected residents of North Carleton in the person of Miss Mary Ann Kirwin at the advanced age of 89 yrs. The deceased was of a kind and cheerful disposition and although she was an invalid for several years she bore her suffering with true christian fortitude. During her last illness her spiritual needs were ministered to by her pastor the Rev. COMING PRESS VISIT.—A meeting was held last evening in the Board of Trade rooms of the committee in charge of arrangements for the visit of the National Editorial Association of the United States which takes place on June 12th. His Worship the Mayor presided. Mr. W. L. Colton reported on the progress made with the arrangements, stating that the visitors would number about 250 and proceed by autos to Summerside where they would be entertained and afterwards leave by train at 11 a. m. for Charlottetown arriving about 12.30. The P. E. I. Motor League would arrange to convey the party to the Experimental Farm where luncheon would be served. The afternoon would be devoted to sight-seeing and at 4 o'clock the visitors would proceed to old Government House where the Lieutenant Governor and Mrs. McKinnon would entertain them to tea. It was agreed to arrange if possible, a pipe playing and highland dancing exhibitions at this entertainment. These provisional arrangements were approved.

Jenkins was taken from his store entrance on Sunnyside, and the bikes of two other citizens, which were stolen, were found later.

MIGRATORY BIRD LAW.—Corporal A. Fraser, of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police, has arrived in Charlottetown from Ottawa in connection with the Enforcement of the Migratory Bird Act. He will visit the principal centres of the Province. Cpl. Fraser is associated in the work with Mr. Rowe, deputy Migratory bird warden, and Mr. Davaney, of Nova Scotia. He reports that the law is being generally respected throughout Canada. Corp. Fraser is a veteran of the late war, having served 3 1/2 years in France with the Fort Garry Horse, a force which lost 50 p. c. of their members in action.

WEDDING BELLS.—A quiet wedding was solemnized on Saturday, May 22nd at Lynn, Mass., when Miss Jessie Margaret Currie, daughter of Mrs. J. D. Currie, Grafton St., became the wife of Mr. T. Henry Canning, Montreal, formerly of Vancouver; the ceremony being performed in St. Stephen's Episcopal church, by the Rev. Appleton Lawrence in the presence of a few immediate friends. After the bridal party partook of dinner at the Copley Plaza Hotel, the happy couple left for New York and Atlantic City. Returning they will reside at 56 Westminster Ave., Montreal West.

AT ACADIA.—The Acadia Collegiate and Business Academy at Wolfville, closed the largest year of its attendance on Monday evening, when 134 students received diplomas. The total enrollment of the Academy was 318. The address of the graduates was delivered by Rev. George C. Warren, B. A., B. D., of Fredericton, a native of North River, P. E. I. Among those who received certificates was Wendell Monette, Summerside, P. E. I. On the evening of the same day the graduate class of Acadia Seminary held their closing day exercises. The valedictory was delivered by Miss Mary Borden Crandall, daughter of Mr. C. F. Crandall, Managing Editor of the Montreal Star. The class prophecy was given by Miss Edith Jenkins, daughter of Councillor R. H. Jenkins, of Charlottetown.

MOLASSES STILL SOARS.—Molasses, the precious juice of the sugar cane, with which the mercury, even in these warm, bright sunshiny days, has been unable to keep pace, is still soaring. It begins to look as if it would be \$2 molasses at retail before very long. Yesterday the wholesale price for the best grade here reached \$1.80 a gallon, the range varying from \$1.55 to the former quotation. Once molasses sold in New Brunswick for thirty-five cents and forty cents a gallon, but that was long ago, somewhere during the time when wheat was thirty-five cents a bushel in the Chicago market. Sugar here is worth \$19.10 at \$19.15 per hundred pounds for granulated. Sugar is considerably higher than this in the United States, and it is said speculators have bought large quantities on this side of the border and have taken it across the line.—St. John Telegraph, 21st.

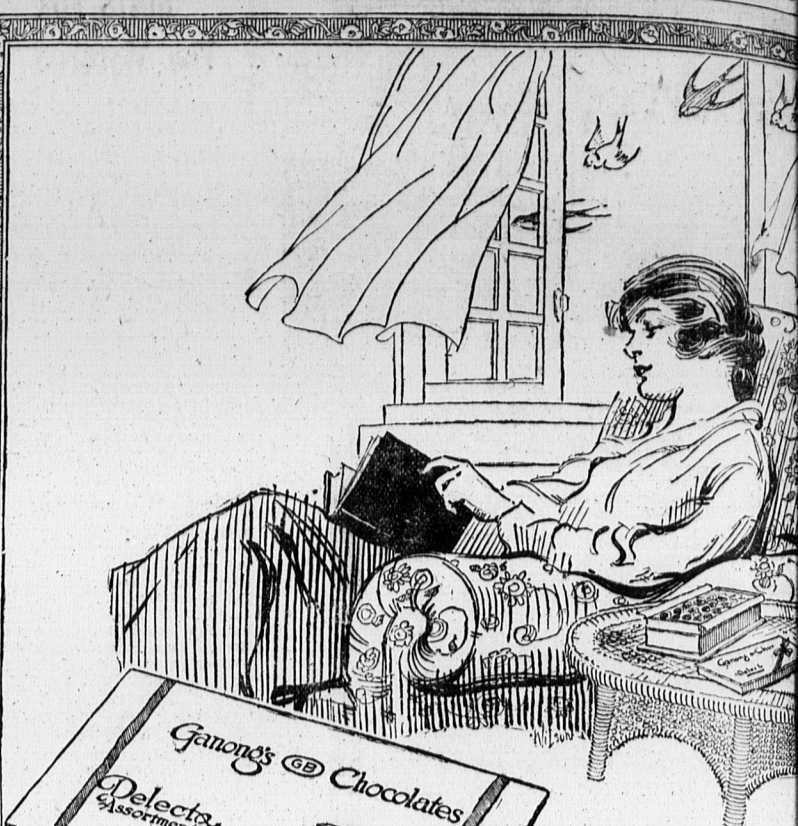
A BAD ACCIDENT.—A shocking accident took place just on the outskirts of Alberton on Saturday morning about 10 o'clock. Mr. Nelson Oliver, who has a farm about two miles from the town, was cutting down a large tree in his orchard. He was endeavoring with the aid of a rope tied well up on the tree to force it to fall in a certain direction and his wife was quite near the tree, while he was chopping it. But unfortunately the tree had its own idea about where and how it was going to fall and Mrs. Oliver was directly under it, it came down with the terrible consequences that her leg and arm were broken and a severe scalp wound with possible internal injuries inflicted. Her many friends hope for recovery but at this writing little if any hope is held out.

LOBSTERS PLENTIFUL.—The factories throughout New London report an abundance of lobsters; in fact so plentiful that they cannot overhaul the traps fast enough. The fishermen are receiving fancy prices for their catches from the boats. Reports from farther East says that the lobsters are very scarce.

ANOTHER VISITATION.—The annual meeting of the New Brunswick and P. E. Island Branch of the Woman's Missionary Society will be held in the Methodist Church, Charlottetown on June 2nd, 3rd, and 4th. It is expected there will be 130 delegates in attendance, among them two returned missionaries, Miss Strothard and Miss Chace. They will arrive on Monday evening, June 1st and will be met at Tormentine by Mrs. Wailer of the Charlottetown Auxiliary. In view of the other visitations to follow shortly of the National Editorial Association of the United States, and later, of the Imperial Press Union, the ladies of the Methodist Church are preparing to entertain the lady visitors as enjoyably as possible, and are arranging among other things, an auto drive to exhibit the attractiveness of the province. It is hoped that everything possible will be done to give the visitors from the sister provinces as warm a welcome as is already assured the two other delegations, which will represent the British Empire and the United States.

STREET ACCIDENT.—While a good deal of complaint has been made of late regarding the reckless driving by motorists, on the streets of Charlottetown these gentlemen have not by any means a monopoly in regard to violating the traffic regulations and some drivers of teams are taking their share. Complaints have been made from time to time of the fast driving around corners and the habit of some drivers in not keeping to their right side of the street. On Wednesday evening as the result of a man driving on the wrong side of the street, an accident occurred which only by good fortune might have proved much worse than happened. Master Robert Hogg, the seven year old son of Mr. W. C. Hogg was driving on his bicycle on Bayfield Street when a team on the wrong side of the street ran into him before he could get out of the way. The horse plunged and came down with his front feet squarely on top of the boy's bicycle sending him and his fork and demolishing the front wheel and precipitating the lad violently to the ground. The driver of the team made no attempt to see if the boy was hurt or to make amends in any way for the damage caused to his wheel but drove away. Fortunately for the lad himself he was not seriously hurt, but received quite a bad fright. Such an accident as this certainly shows the need of carefulness in driving.

INSTITUTE MEETING.—On May 3rd, the monthly meeting of the Red Point Women's Institute was held at the home of the President, Mrs. A. McInnis. After the unfinished business was disposed of it was suggested that each member bring some article of fancy work to our next meeting for the bazaar that the Institute intends to hold in the near future. Premier, Speaker and members of the Provincial Legislature, Whereas great harassments and inconveniences are caused by the auto traffic in the rural districts, and whereas representatives of the present Government hold out the prospect that the auto traffic could be closed for two days in each week. Therefore resolved that the Red Point Women's Institute, in conjunction with the men of the district, join in petitioning the Provincial Legislature that the auto traffic be stopped in this district for two days in each week, and that the Sunday regulation be the same as before July 1919. 2nd.
