ANOTHER FIRE IN HALIFAX.
HALIFAX, Sept. 19.-(Special)-Fire
early this morning destroyed Black Bros.
two wooden warehouses with their stock
of hardware and dry fish;
Pickford's & Black's warehouse,
Thomas Forhan's sail loft;
Thos. Joyne's blacksmith;
Black Bros. wharf;
Lesie, Hart & Co's office;
Black Bros. brick warehouse;
George Cook's warehouse;
Pickford & Black's mail building and
stone warehouse.

VERY HEAVY LOSSES.
The loss is very heavy and the in-
surance fully \$175,000.
Many valuable stocks were in the
burned buildings.

uted to Him

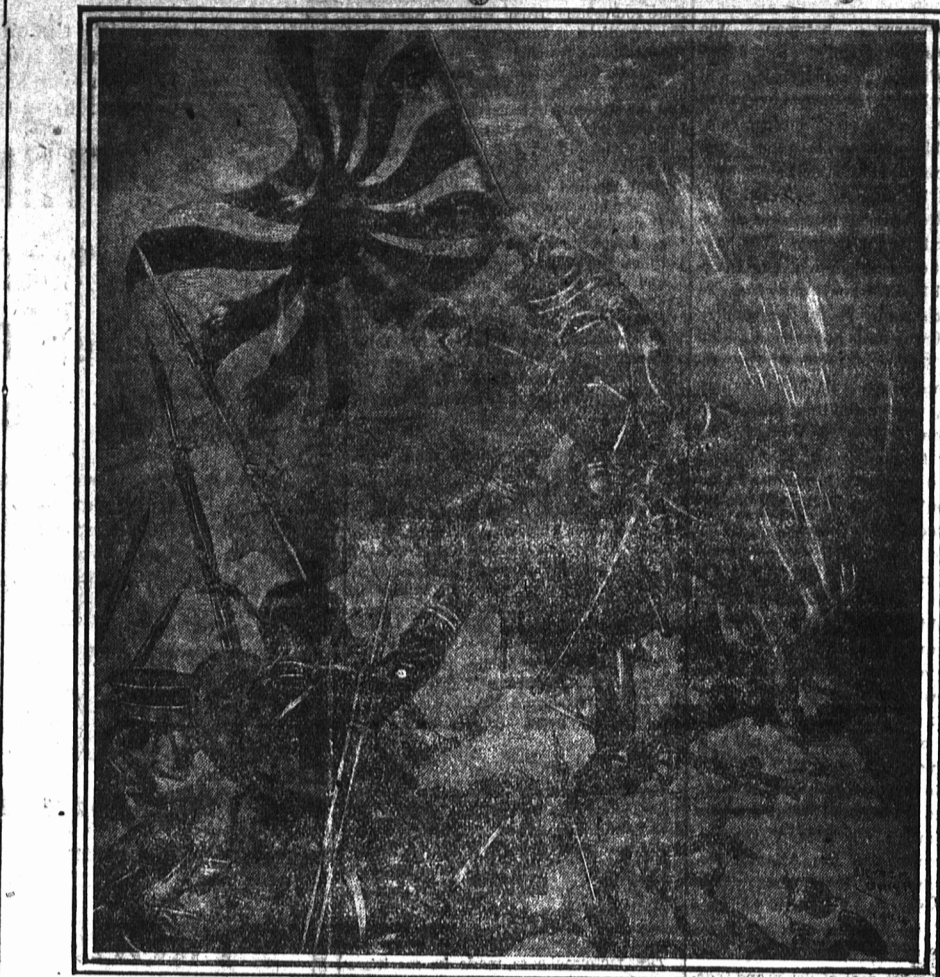
F. S. Jost Denies that He Gave an

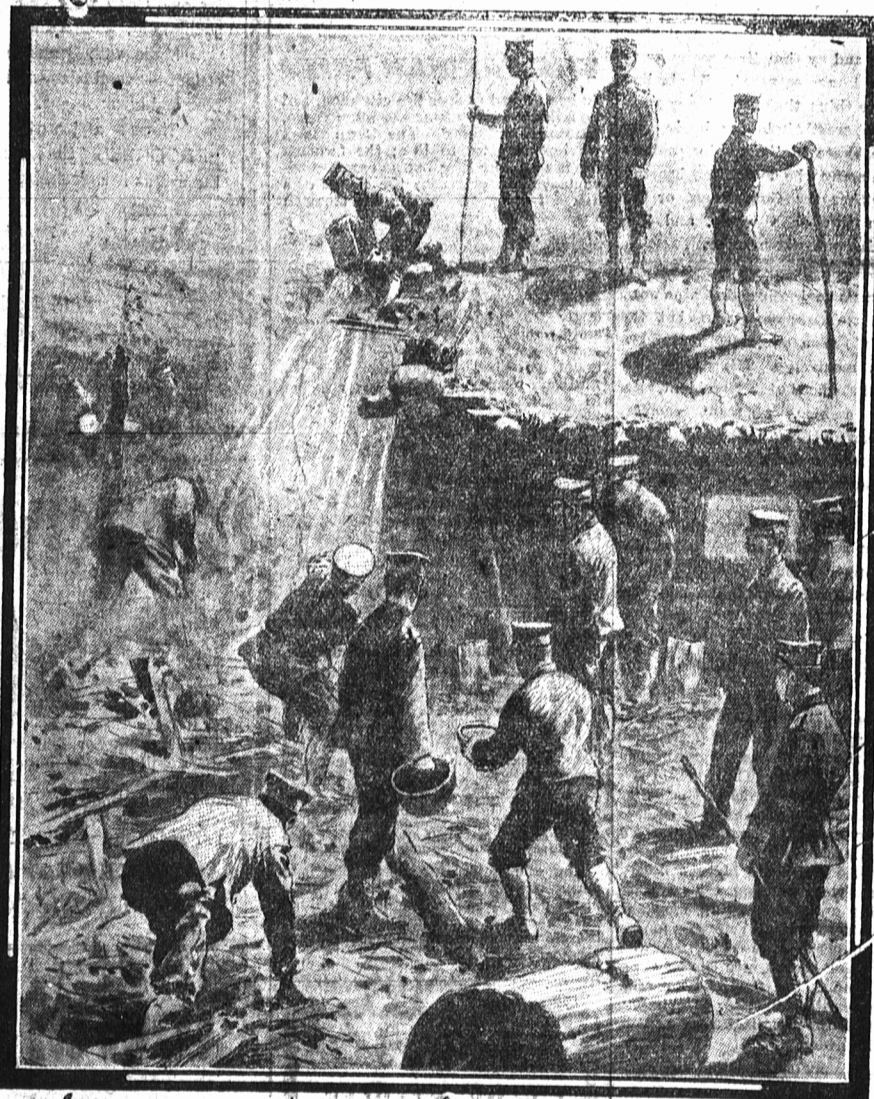

CROSS OCEAN IN TWO DAYS.

TORONTO, September 18. "We will
cross the ocean in two days with my
tubular boat," said Inventor Knapp, of
roller boat fame, today. "Turbine engines
will be used, and the craft will have a
freight capacity of 15,000 tons besides an
equal amount of space for passengers." He
says he will leave for England in a
few days to put his scheme into practice.
He will go to Milford Haven, which has
spent \$10,000,000 in improving the harbor,
and will ask for \$20,000, guaranteeing
in return to make the harbor the terminus
of the fastest ocean service in the
world.

MORE FIGHTING AND HEAVY LOSSES

The Czar Orders a Second Manchurian Army -The Siberian Railway Choked with Military Traffic-Distress Feared Along the Line-Japs Shelling Russian Positions Around Mukden.

ANOTHER MANCHURIAN ARMY.
St. PETERSBURG, Sept. 19.-(Special)-
Emperor Nicholas has decided to orga-
nize a second Manchurian army or corps
now going to the front under General
Linevich, with General Kuropatkin in
supreme command of both armies.
JAPS FORCES INCREASED.
Gen. Kuropatkin reports that Generals
Rennenkampf and Samsonoff, conducting
important reconnaissances resulted in
heavy fighting with many casualties and
showed the Japanese forces have been
further increased.
SIBERIAN RAILWAY BLOCKED.
The Siberian railroad is so blocked by
military traffic that great distress is
feared this winter in places depending
on it for supplies.
JAPS ACTIVE AT MUKDEN.
LONDON, Sept. 19.-It is asserted in a

despatch from Tokio to The Express that
the Japanese are vigorously shelling the
Russian position at Mukden, preparatory
to a general advance and are endeavor-
ing by a wide turning movement to cut
off Kuropatkin's retreat.
THE TOWN SURROUNDED.
The Japanese armies, the despatch adds,
are disposed in the same positions as
they were in at the fighting before Liao
Yang.
[It would appear that the Japanese com-
manders intend to capture both Mukden
and Port Arthur before winter sets in.
Both mean heavy and prolonged fight
but there are yet two or three m-
onths for the purpose. The di-
dition of the Siberian Rail-
way now experienced will grow
in the winter.]

TWO VESSELS LOST.

DETROIT, September 16.-(Special) to
the Tribune tell of two vessels lost on
Lake Huron yesterday. The barge Gard-
ner caught fire and sank seven miles
above Sault Ste. Marie and about two and a
half miles off shore. The Canadian schooner
Singapore was dashed on the beach off
Kingcarline, Ont. No lives were lost on
either vessels.

WILL BECOME A MONK

MONTREAL, Sept. 17.-Mr Romand
Laurier, son of Mr Charlemagne Laurier,
M. P. and nephew of Sir Wilfrid Laurier,
has abandoned his studies in medicine at
Laval, in order to enter monastic life with
the Dominican Order, at St. Hyacinthe.
The decision of young Mr. Laurier has
surprised his friends. He is 24 years of
age and during the two years he has been
at Laval he has carried off high honor.
