Cook's Corner

YORKSHIRE PUDDING

This recipe serves four or five and should be served with a roast of beef cooked your favorite way.

Ingredients: Four tablespoons sifted flour; one egg; one-half teaspoon salt; one-half pint of milk.

Method: Sift two tablespoons flour into bowl. Then thoroughly beat egg and add to flour. Mix these two ingredients together, then add the remaining two tablespoons sifted flour and mix. Add milk and beat thoroughly with rotary egg-beater until flour, milk and egg are thoroughly combined.

Into a nine-inch deep pie dish or other utensil, pour six tablespoons of hot beef drippings taken from the roasting beef. Then place the dish on a shelf under the roasting oven and allow the fat to become so hot that the dripping is sizzling. Into this sizzling fat, the Yorkshire pudding mixture is poured, but just before pouring it in, beat it again with a rotary egg-beater and allow to bake about 45 or 50 minutes. The pudding will have a brown crispy outside and a soft centre. If you like a pudding of more solid consistency, increase the amount of flour by two tablespoons.

SAVORY NOODLE CUSTARDS

4 ounces fine egg noodles
3 eggs, slightly beaten
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon curry powder
1 teaspoon grated onion
3 cups scalded milk
1 cup diced cooked chicken (or other cooked meat)

2 tablespoons chopped toasted blanched almonds, optional.

Cook the egg noodles, uncovered, in plenty of rapidly boiling salted water until tender (allow 1 teaspoon salt to each quart water). Drain, rinse, then drain thoroughly. Sprinkle the slightly beaten eggs with salt and curry powder; add grated onion and mix. Slowly stir in the scalded milk; add chicken

Persons who have intelligent questions to ask on price control are invited to send them, in writing to the Women's Regional Advisory Committee.

Q. I want my son who was recently discharged from the services to occupy one of the apartments and I was told that unless he lived here before he went overseas, he could not have the apartment.

A. A landlord who owns a multiple family dwelling, i. e. apartment house or duplex or duplex etc., which is self-contained housing unit with separate entrance, may give six months notice to the tenant to vacate between September 30 and April 30. If the tenant is on a lease for a term certain of from year to year, the notice must be served at least six months before the end of the term.

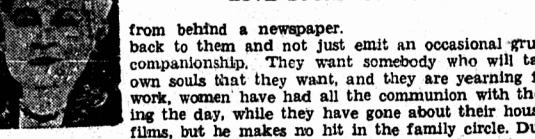

Ham'n Egg Baskets



As bright and fresh as the merry chirp of the first robin is this new recipe suggestion for shredded wheat Ham'n Egg Baskets, yet the only three ingredients needed are eggs, ham and shredded wheat. Here's a spring tonic for winter weary appetites.

1 1/2 cups milk
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup shredded watercress
Cut out rectangles from centre of shredded wheat biscuits with scissors to form basket. Place "baskets" in shallow baking pan and fill each with 2 slices of ham, 1 slice of egg, 1 slice of watercress. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F) 20 minutes. Melt white sauce of butter, flour and milk; add salt, onion and watercress. Serve sauce over Ham'n Egg Baskets. Serves 4.

Two young Australian farmers who recently grew celery in the irrigation area of Leeton, New South Wales, have won themselves fame. They broke a record by growing celery successfully for the first time in the area; their produce was so good it topped sales at the Sydney market; and in their experimental crop they devised a way to cut down the cost of celery growing. In order to keep it white, growers have to keep hilling up the soil around the stalks to keep out the sunburning. This means extra labor. The two Australian farmers blanched their celery successfully by prying tarred paper along each side of the row, slipping the paper together over the top of the celery, thus allowing space for the leaves to push up.
