Americans Find Chinese Recovery Hopeless Jot (By J. M. Roberts, Jr., Associated Press News Analyst) Americans working on the Chinese recovery program are beginning to learn what a vast and practically hopeless job they have. Charles Stillman, head of the survey mission, says results from the first \$60,000,000 will be negligible. Students of Chinese affairs will bet him that he learns the same thing about the forthcoming \$400,000,000, too. The recent 50-percent drop in the value of the Chinese dollar is not the problem. It is merely a symptom. When American experts began to figure what they could do to help China they had no more hope of restoring the currency. They only hoped to prevent further deterioration. They figured this holding operation could be conducted for one year with \$510,000,000 in immediate relief, \$60,000,000 for the first \$400,000,000, and the holding operation became a mere delaying operation. Even that has come too late. There is a wholesale flight of capital from China. Fred Hampton, Associated Press correspondent in Shanghai, reports that every day, by plane, ship, donkey cart or back pack, great amounts of money move into Shanghai to seek conversion into wealth which can be sent abroad, or to Canton to buy Hong Kong dollars. This flight of capital represents the attitude toward their own country of the private enterprises with which the Americans hope to work recovery. Talk of a "real" aid program for China overlooks some of the inherent qualities of the situation. An "old China hand" expressed it to me this way: "How can you help a nation that doesn't exist? He meant that China is not a country, but an area, largely wasteland, in which 400,000,000 people, mostly unconscious politically, scramble for one meal to the next. Some experts estimate that 100,000,000 people in China pay neither allegiance nor taxes to anything which could be called an organized government. The Nanking Government controls some 200,000,000 people. Communist-held territory embraces some 140,000,000. The rest are scattered in vast, isolated areas in more or less tribal fashion.

Strike Will Cause Mail Restrictions OTTAWA, July 13 - In the event of a railway strike becoming effective in Canada on July 15, there will be a drastic curtailment of mail services. Hon. Ernest Berrand, M.C., M.P., Postmaster General announced today. Effective the moment the strike starts all mail services within Canada, and to and from other countries, will be suspended, with the following exceptions: 1. Ordinary correspondence up to one ounce in weight. 2. Air mail in the nature of correspondence, without weight limit, prepaid at air mail rates. 3. Medicines including analgesics, specimens and other similar items prepaid at normal rates. Except as provided for in the above, no mail will be accepted or carried during the period of the strike. The railways having indicated that the deadline for the strike is six a.m. Thursday, July 15, and that if it becomes effective, all trains will be stopped at the nearest convenient points on or about that time, the public is warned to take this possibility into consideration in making mailings before then of parcel post, publications, newspapers and printed matter. Effective immediately, in cases where such mailings are made to points which cannot be reached before the strike deadline, they will be accepted only at the sender's risk. No perishables will be accepted. The Postmaster General assures the public that in the event of a strike the Postal Service will spare no effort to provide service within the limits prescribed, but that as a measure of co-operation until the picture is clarified, all mailings should henceforth be withheld unless they qualify as mail to be accepted and carried throughout the period of the strike.

Mutiny On U. S. Ship At An End LONDON, July 13-(AP) - The United States battleship Missouri messaged today that "everything is under control" aboard the United States freighter William Carson. The freighter flashed an SOS last night that her crew had mutinied. Rear-Admiral A. J. McLean, commanding the Missouri, said he had been in touch with the tanker Hampton Roads which, in turn, had received the message from the Carson "that 'everything is under control'." The master of the Hampton Roads in a message to the Associated Press said he passed the William Carson about 35 minutes after the freighter sent the message about the mutiny. He said the mutiny message had been cancelled 26 minutes after it was sent - or 10 minutes before he

passed the freighter. The Hampton Roads passed close by the William Carson, the master's message said, and no signs of disorder could be seen.

Canada Markets Bonds In The U. S. OTTAWA, July 13 - (OP) - Canada has gone into the United States money market to help ease her shortage of American funds. Finance Minister Abbott announced today that the Government has marketed \$150,000,000 worth of long-term, three per cent bonds with a group of American insurance companies. Principally, the money raised through the bonds issue will be used to repay \$140,000,000 which Canada has drawn thus far on the \$200,000,000 credit she obtained last fall from the United States Government Export-Import Bank. This is the first time Canada has borrowed money in New York since 1943 when she raised \$90,000,000 to retire bonds which were becoming due at that time. Before the depression Canada frequently borrowed money in the United States to finance development but since 1930 borrowing has been for the sole purpose of retiring obligations of earlier years. Any new money required has been raised by domestic loans.
