Missouri River Floods Continue

OMAHA, Neb., June 24 —(AP)—Crop and property damage mounted today as midwest floods, which already have taken a toll of lives, spread out over thousands of acres of corn and wheat and washed out railroad lines and highways.

Maj.-Gen. Lewis A. Pick, United States Army Missouri River division engineer, said "up to the current floods our preliminary estimate of flood damage in the Missouri basin this year was about \$60,000,000. These floods will boost that figure considerably higher."
