**SARK IS CHIEF OF THE INDIANS**

**The Election at Lennox Island Yesterday**

**Results in His Triumphant Return — The Results of the Storm in the Western Part of the Province.**

The election on Lennox Island yesterday for Chief of the Indians of this Province resulted in a victory for the former Chief John Sark, with a majority of two votes over his opponent, Joseph Bernard, jr. A man named Thomas also contested, but did not secure any votes. There was only one poll and the vote stood: Sark 23, Bernard, 27. It will be remembered that the election held last winter which was protested by Sark the vote stood on Lennox Island Joseph Francis 20, John Sark 27, while Morell gave Sark 12 and Francis 1. The Morell poll, however, was not counted owing to the election at that place being held on the wrong date. Thus it will be seen that Sark made a slight gain, winning over 25—two of opposition voters. The Morell Indians, who in the last election went strong for Sark, seem not to have been re-resented in the election of yesterday possibly because of their poll being too far away. At the last election they voted in their own settlement.

Reports from different parts of Prince County go to show that the electrical storm of Sunday evening was quite general in this part of the Province, though there were a few places which escaped. The most serious no doubt of the lightning seems to have been at Nail Pond, where the dwelling house of Joseph J. Arsenault was struck and badly shattered. The current struck the chimney demolishing it, entered the roof and descended through the the house. Mr. and Mrs. Arsenault and four children who were together in a room on the ground floor were all stunned. Mrs. Arsenault's both shoes were torn from her feet, one foot being badly out. The eldest boy about fifteen years of age was most severely injured so badly that for some time he was supposed dead. Two physicians and a priest were summoned to the place. The priest prepared the young man for death and the doctor administered to his physical wants. It was two or three hours before he regained consciousness, one of his legs and part of his body were badly injured, his clothes having caught fire. Mr. Arsenault was the least affected. He was knocked down but soon recovered from the shock, and assisted the others who all apart from the one referred to regained consciousness before the physician arrived. Yesterday the injured ones were reported doing well.
