GRAND TEA PARTY

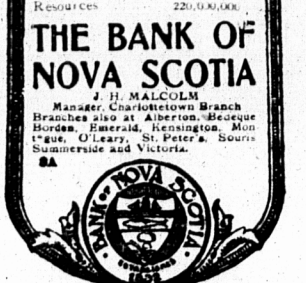
The Tyne Valley Improvement Association intend holding a GRAND TEA PARTY at TYNE VALLEY on Wednesday, July 9th, next.
