

IN MEMORIAM

JAMES NEIL MacLEOD

On March 18th there passed to the reward of the life of faith James N. MacLeod, Elder, Orwell in the ninetieth year of his age. His wife, Jane Nicholson predeceased him in 1917. He is survived by three sons and a daughter: Charles and Theophilus in Cuba where they own a large sugar estate; John Albert in California and Isabel, Mrs. J. H. C. Acorn, Portland, Ore. Mr. MacLeod was outstanding in his community as a Christian character, quiet, sincere, dependable, by his life "adorning the doctrine of God his Saviour." He was for over fifty years an elder in his church, in which position he held the highest esteem and confidence of all. During his later years he lived in his old home cared for by Mr. and Mrs. Neil MacLeod being visited by the members of his family as opportunity offered. It was a delight and a benediction to visit the old saint. All physical needs being lovingly provided he had nothing but praise for all. His great interest was in the spiritual welfare of his neighbors. To the shut-ins whom he could not visit he sent booklets, tracts and letters. To within a short time of his death his mind was clear and his interest in all unchanged. The funeral service was held on March 20th in St. Andrew's church, conducted by Rev. J. A. McLellan, Vallefield where a large congregation gathered to honor the name of one whom they loved much. Due to a telegram from Cuba the remains were not buried till March 29th, when his son Theophilus was able to be present when the remains were laid in the Orwell cemetery.

MISS LOUISE McLEOD.

The death of Miss Louise McLeod at her home "The Cove", Park Corner on the 19th at the age of 84 years removed one of the most striking personalities to be met with in a long time and a wide region. She was the daughter of Mr. John McLeod, the eldest of a family of twelve—eight brothers and three sisters—all of them greatly gifted, among whom was "H. C." who rose to the distinction of being president of the Bank of Nova Scotia and by his great abilities making the bank one of the strongest in America. Miss Louise's death was not unlooked for as she had been an invalid from rheumatic arthritis for twenty-six years, and during the last year and a half she had been almost bed-ridden. She had spent many winters in search of health under the direction of the best medical advice in such well known resorts as the Hot Springs, Virginia, Pinehurst, North Carolina and Jamaica. But nothing could hold back the progress of the disease, and very little to relieve the sufferings. She was possessed of a mind of rare vigor, and a spirit that showed fortitude and with resignation full of hope and the desire to know the mystery which the love of God holds for his people on the other side.

The devotion of a niece Edith and a nephew Vernon to whom she had been as a mother when they were motherless was a great delight to her. Having lived in Charlottetown for a number of years she will be remembered by many friends there.

The following members of the family are: H. Collingwood of Mont Clair, N. J.; Newton of French River; Captain Alfred of French River and A. C. of Park Corner.

The interment was in the Geddie Memorial Church cemetery. The funeral services were conducted by the Rev. George Millar. Among the floral tributes was a wreath from H. C. McLeod, Mont Clair, N. J.; and another from Miss Edith McLeod, Toronto; sprays from Mr. and Mrs. V. D. McLeod, St. Catharines; Charles Manning, Toronto; J. A. McLeod, Toronto and a cross from Mrs. Ferguson, Spring Brook. The pall bearers were: Messrs. Jas. Simms, William Delaney, Everette McLeod, J. S. Palmer and J. H. Pidgeon.

THE LATE JAMES DUNN

A sad gloom was cast over the community of Newton Cross on the morning of February 23rd when it was learned that one of its most respected citizens in the person of James Dunn had passed to his eternal reward after a short illness of about ten days.

The late Mr. Dunn was born in Iona seventy-three years ago. Early in life he went to Michigan where he worked for several years

in the lumber woods. Getting tired of that kind of life, he again returned to the Island and purchased a large farm in Newton Cross where he has lived ever since.

Of a family of nine children, six are left to mourn the loss of a kind and loving father, namely Edward, Joseph, William and Mary at home, Paul in Boston and John in Western Canada.

Deceased was a man of many admirable qualities being very honest and upright in all his dealings and always had great respect for the Church and the clergy.

His funeral took place on Monday morning Feb. 25th and was followed by a vast host of friends and relatives to St. Michael's Church, Iona, where Requiem Mass was sung by his pastor, Rev. Fr. Duffy, after which his remains were tenderly laid in the family plot beside his wife who predeceased him some fifteen years ago. Requiescat in Pace.

Quietly and peacefully the spirit of Selina Coady passed to its eternal reward on the afternoon of Wednesday, March the twenty-sixth at the early age of twenty-five years. Four years previous she had entered the novitiate of the Cong. De Notre Dame, Montreal, and was known to her companions in Religion, as Sr. St. Terence, she taught for some time in St. Anthony's Academy, Montreal, and whilst there contracted sciatia from which she never recovered, every kindness was given her by the sisters of the community and the best medical aid procured, but all unavailing and she returned to her home in Emyvale. Her family left nothing undone to restore her health, but rheumatism had affected her heart, she gradually sank until on the above date, strengthened by the consolations of Holy Church, she gave the life, she tried so hard on earth to consecrate to God.

The funeral took place on Friday, twenty-eighth to St. Ann's Church where the Mass of Requiem was celebrated by the Pastor and the final absolutions given. Then the mortal remains of a dutiful daughter and loving sister were consigned to their last resting place. MR. NEIL McNEVIN

Twenty-one years ago, he left his native home for B. C., and for a number of years worked for the Granby Co., and was a foreman when the company ceased operations at Grand Forks.

A strong Presbyterian, he served a number of years on the board of management of Knox Church, and for the past four years was a member of session. And only recently the local churches entered into union and he was again elected elder.

The funeral was held on March 1st from the United Church, and was largely attended. Interment in Oddfellows cemetery.

A strong man in the prime of life had been called hence and leaves in the bereaved home a loving wife and four children, besides his aged mother at the old home. Carson Bonshaw; Hector A. Cooze Cove; J. Peter, Vancouver, B. C.; James of Rocky Point and George at home.

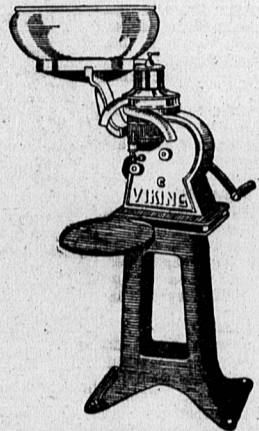
