The weather was favourable and the wicket in good condition, and the enthusiasm displayed by the participants augurs well for the future of this great national game in this island.

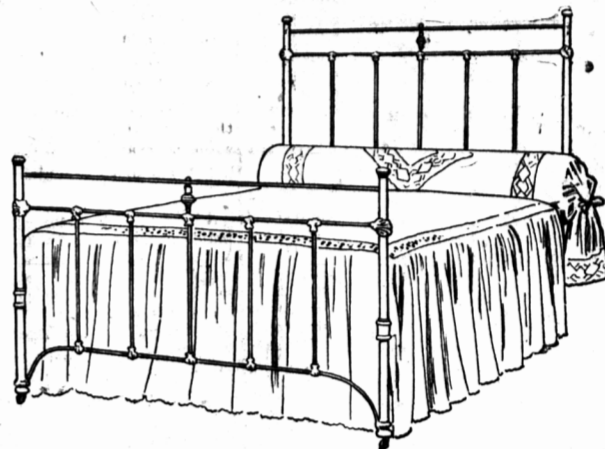
