The Little Theatre Guild of Charlottetown ushered in their autumn season last night by presenting a capacity audience with three one-act plays, 'The Maker of Dreams', and 'The Dear Departed', under the direction of Mrs. Vera Millar and Miss Edith Hill. And an additional play by Sumnerville players, under the direction of Mrs. Creechman MacArthur. 'The Dear Departed' was a humorous satire on people who gather round like a flock of vultures to divide the spoils left by a deceased relative. The play opens with the two daughters of Abel planning as to how they will portion the wealth left by their supposedly dead father. The fun begins when old Abel, makes his appearance and informs them he is going to leave his money to the woman he is about to marry, the widow, Mrs. John Shortkrook, who is the keeper of the local tavern, the Ring O' Bells. Miss Hill, who has recently graduated from Emerson College in Boston, in dramatics and public speaking, is to be favourably commended for her direction of this play. 'The Dear Departed' as written, does not offer a very material but, under Miss Hill's capable directorship, it was transformed into a realistic creation of everyday humor.

Canadian Art Features Local Exhibition

Fifty-Eight Paintings By Dominion Artists On Display At Harris Gallery. An excellent exhibition of paintings by contemporary Canadian artists opened at the Harris Memorial Gallery in the Library Building, Charlottetown yesterday afternoon. Fifty-eight pictures, including portraits and sea scenes, and numerous other subjects made up the delightful collection which forms one of a series of travelling exhibitions arranged by the National Gallery, Ottawa, for the purpose of keeping art societies and individuals in the various parts of the Dominion abreast of the current productions in Canadian art. The pictures in the group now on display were selected by the Royal Canadian Academy of Arts representative of its thirty-eighth annual exhibition in Montreal. The local exhibition, which is under the auspices of the Prince Edward Island Art Society, is the first of three which the Society plans to bring here during the autumn and winter months. Pictures on display include those by such well known artists as A. J. Cascan, A. R. C. A. whose painting 'The Village Mill' is very attractive. F. S. Coburn, R. C. A., another prominent Canadian painter has a picture which he calls 'Chinatown' while Mackinnon, A. R. C. A. has a really striking picture in his 'Boy Fishing'. 'Evening' by B. H. Hutchison and other pictures which are well worth a visit. The exhibition is to be open every afternoon this week, including Sunday and in addition will be open this evening and Saturday evening.
