Irishtown Meeting On Tuesday Night

The meeting at Irishtown called by Hon. C. W. Crosby on Tuesday evening was well attended among those present being several gentlemen from Charlottetown and Prince County. Mr. Andrew Lund, Burlington, presided.

Mr. Harold Palmer spoke at considerable length deploring the opposition to Mr. Crosby, generally acquiescing in the promises made by the Bell candidates and as generally condemning everything done or not done by the Arsenault government.

Mr. Thomas Wigmore, the Liberal Conservative candidate, was the next speaker. This was Mr. Wigmore's first appearance in the role of a candidate and he certainly made a good impression. He referred at the outset to the promises made by the Liberal candidates to secure a \$2000 gratuity for the soldiers and their admission after the election, that the grant was impossible. Personally he would favor such a grant if the finances of the Dominion would warrant it. He also took up other Liberal pre-election promises claiming that on the strength of these the party led by Mr. Bell succeeded in securing the Government. They were now up against their promises and found they could not fulfill them. He contended that in the interests of the province there should be a farmer on the opposition and promised, if elected, to do his best for the province generally and for the farmers particularly.

Hon. F. J. Nash followed. He was in splendid form and made a stirring speech which abounded in extravagances and strong denunciations of the Arsenault Government. He produced a document purporting to be a financial statement from January to September 9th showing that during this short space of time the Arsenault Government had spent in round numbers about half a million dollars. He forgot to tell the audience what the Arsenault Government had bought with their heavy expenditure or how much of it was handed over to the Bell Government. While Mr. Nash expected to create a sensation with this document it fell flat as the majority of the audience saw through the trick at once. He next took up the education question which, like the finances, he declared to be in a deplorable condition and intimated that it was possible that the pupils of the province would be without teachers for some time to come. He gave no solution of the education problem but said the Government would handle it in a business way. He hinted that a tax on the moneys subscribed for the schools annually—and this means might be resorted to.

Mr. A. E. McLean followed. He pointed out that Mr. Crosby had been elected and chosen Commissioner of

Public Works and urged every elector to come to his support on Election Day. He shed a few tears over the financial statement presented by Mr. Nash and felt so badly about it that he too overlooked the fact that the Arsenault Government had, with the money alleged to have been spent purchased practically all the supplies for the current year and so saved the Bell government the expense of buying them. Mr. McLean placed the expenditure at \$372,000 which Mr. Nash had placed at half a million, but the audience did not appear to mind this. (One in the audience remarked that if Mr. John Cann had had the handling of that statement he would easily have made the deficit a million). Mr. McLean also condemned the system of road-making followed by the Arsenault Government and stated that thousands of dollars were being foolishly spent on the roads, while many thousands were lost by the exemption of road masters and their horses from taxation.

The meeting was not large and the speakers were all given an attentive hearing.

RECOVERED MONEY FROM GYPSIES AT POINT OF A GUN

Liverpool, Sept. 30.—Queens County had its share of the depredations of itinerant gypsy bands today. This afternoon, a band of them passing through Brooklyn, N. S., called at the store of Collin McLeod, and before they proceeded on their way they had succeeded in taking with them \$100 of McLeod's money. McLeod, who came here immediately after the occurrence declares that he was hypnotized by the gypsies. They asked him to take out his purse and they would "bless" his money for him. He complied and after the gypsies had left the store and moved on out of the village Mr. McLeod discovered that, while the purse still remained in his hand, \$100 of the money it contained was gone. He swore out a warrant in Liverpool, and armed with this Constable Pat McAuliffe headed off the gypsies with an automobile at the point of a revolver forced them to give up the \$100 and an additional amount of \$40 to cover expenses.

FARMER MEMBERS AFTER O'CONNOR

(Special to The Guardian.) OTTAWA, Oct. 1.—Farmer members of the House again landed on "that man O'Connor" with both feet when the bill to increase his salary came up in the Commons tonight. Donald Sutherland, of the great dairy county of Oxford was again the ringleader. He had not forgotten that Mr. O'Connor had not tried to stop the farmers from raising the price of milk. He remarked today that the profiteer hunter in reply to recent criticism had opined that his hands were tied. "His tongue certainly was not tied," exclaimed Mr. Sutherland, boiling with indignation. "Nor did the member of South Oxford approve of the publicity given in the press to the doings of the new Board of Commerce."

ERUPTION OF VOLCANO

HONOLULU, Sept. 30.—Two ranch homes and much valuable Koa forest has been destroyed by the lava flow from the latest eruption of the volcano of Mauna Loa, on the island of Hawaii. The flow apparently is a mile wide and is moving rapidly. It will probably reach the ocean, thirty miles from the volcano, today.
