SUPPLEMENTARY ESTIMATES.

Supplementary estimates aggregating a large sum to be expended on various public works and services in Prince Edward Island during the current year, have been submitted to Parliament. At this writing we are not informed as to the amounts estimated for like services in other Provinces, but we may safely assume that they are on a like liberal scale. For the treasury has been overflowed of late, and moreover a general election is comparatively near at hand, whether or not this latter condition has helped to increase the grants we can only surmise, but we are disposed to accept with all cheerfulness the proposed large expenditure of the people's money in the people's midst for useful public services.

There are two or more of the grants which we are much pleased to take note of. One of these is a grant of \$5,000 for the extension of the railway track along the water front of Charlottetown. That will at least make a beginning, and the beginning would hardly be made without the intention of carrying the work forward to completion. Another grant of \$5,000 is provided for an improved telegraph service. Presumably this is a grant for the year. If so, it ought to be sufficient to give to the people of this city and Island the same hours of telegraph service at the same rate as are enjoyed by the people of the other Provinces. If so it will be a great boon to the entire community—long delayed, but still a great gain.

We confess not to understand the position in which the proposed new railway station is left; or what the vote of \$25,000 for "increased accommodation at Charlottetown" may exactly mean. A new station on a new site is greatly needed, but the grant proposed is entirely insufficient for that purpose. We await further light in regard to this item. But we freely acknowledge that in regard to the general provisions for railway extensions and harbor improvements at principal ports the estimates as published reflect credit upon our representatives in general. It must be especially gratifying to Mr. Hazard M. P. and those who supported him at his election that during his first session at Ottawa and no doubt very largely through his judicious efforts, grants have been obtained to improve the telegraph service and extend the railway wharf on the water front. These needed improvements had been so long delayed that many were inclined to despair of ever seeing them effected.

Strange to say the despatches referring to the representation case give Mr. Aylesworth credit for what is called a new and ingenious point, to the effect that the original representation of a Province could not be decreased. This point was raised in many newspapers, including The Guardian long before Mr. Aylesworth raised it. It is by no means a new point.
