Max Baer Stops Pat Comiskey In First Of Scheduled 15-round Bout

JERSEY CITY, N.J., Sept. 26 (AP)—Max Baer, 223½ pound former heavyweight champion, stopped Pat Comiskey, 207½, hitherto highly regarded heavyweight prospect, in two minutes, 39 seconds of the first round of their scheduled 15-round bout before a chilled crowd of about 10,000 fans tonight.

After a few brief exchanges, with neither having the upper hand, Max stepped in and nailed Pat with a right hand. The Irishman went down for an eight-count. As he got up, Max rushed in and belted him at will.

As Pat huddled against the ropes, staring out of danger, referee Jack Dempsey rushed in and pulled Baer off.

Dempsey waved them into action again. Max rushed in as Pat backed away, leaning half way through the ropes as he tried to protect himself. With Comiskey making no return shots at Baer and Max just flailing away, Dempsey stopped the fight.

Round One

Comiskey immediately started pecking away with his left hand, landed two stiff rights to the body. Baer hurt Comiskey badly with several smashing rights to the face. Comiskey came back with a two-fisted attack.

In close, they exchanged lefts to the body. Baer threw a hard right to the body and Pat countered with two left jabs to the jaw. They stood toe to toe near a neutral corner and slugged. Baer hurt Pat with two rights to the head, and then floored Pat against the ropes with a short right for an eight-count.

Baer rushed in and drove Pat against the ropes. Baer was belting at will and Comiskey huddled against the ropes, helplessly, trying to protect himself. Referee Dempsey stepped in and halted the bout with Baer winning by a technical knockout at 2:39 of the first round.

Yanks Still In Running, Win Twice

NEW YORK, Sept. 26 (AP)—The Yankees continued their winning ways today in a doubleheader with the Athletics at Philadelphia scoring 5-4 and 2-0 triumphs to keep alive a faint hope of retaining their American League Championship.

Reds Will Be Favorites In World Series

NEW YORK, Sept. 26 (AP)—It's been a long time since a National League team went into the World Series with a certified chance to win, but this year Cincinnati Reds not only have a chance, they are likely to be rated favorites.

The exhausting finish of the American League campaign has served to enhance the prospects of the Reds, who already were a good bet on their own merits.

There is little question that Cincinnati's foe eventually will be Detroit Tigers, but the race isn't over yet and they are being forced to go "all out" in order to win.

At one time this season Detroit had one of the best pitching staffs in the American League, but the boys don't look it now. Buck Newsum had to work in two games yesterday. Tommy Bridges hasn't been able to finish his last three starts. Young Hal Newhouser, one of the best rookies to come up this year, had a sore arm. Schoolboy Rowe will have to pitch his heart out to beat Bob Feller tomorrow and if he fails, Newsum may have to go back to the hill Saturday or Sunday.

On the other hand the Reds are coasting to the goal with Bill McKechnie sharpening his pitchers to a razor edge.

Reds Pass Last Year's Win Mark

NEW YORK, Sept. 26 (AP)—The National League Champion Cincinnati Reds won their 38th victory of the season at St. Louis today putting them one game ahead of the total by which they gained the 1939 pennant.

After taking the first game of a doubleheader from the Cardinals 4-3 to better their last year's record, the Reds dropped the second 5-1 to a rookie studded opposition.

At New York the "September salary spurt" of the Giants netted them two triumphs over Philadelphia Phillies, 3-1 and 2-1, before 1,200 fans, smallest crowd of the season at the Polo Grounds.

At Brooklyn, the Dodgers closed their home season by dropping a doubleheader to Boston Bees 5-2 and 5-4.

At Chicago Pittsburgh Pirates, fighting to hold fourth place beat out the Cubs 7-6. They are now two games ahead of the Cubs.

Compete In Sport Within Colleges

TORONTO, Sept. 26 (CP)—Governing bodies of various Canadian universities have confirmed the agreement of the Canadian Universities Conference to the effect that competitive sport within each university may well be developed in conjunction with military training, says Dr. H. J. Cody, president of the University of Toronto and president of the Conference.

Some weeks ago it was announced that the proposed Senior Inter-collegiate Football Schedule issued April 1 for the 1940 season had been cancelled on account of war conditions.

Dr. Cody's statement recalls a meeting of the Conference at which Dr. J. C. Simpson of McGill University, Montreal, speaking on behalf of the athletic authorities of Toronto, Queen's Western, and McGill stated that he felt that while athletics must be an integral part of military training, it must be a secondary objective in wartime.

It was held unwise to continue Senior Intercollegiate competition during the coming academic year, Dr. Simpson said. The reasons were that the time and energy of male students should now be devoted to military training and they would sacrifice some of their usual interests to fulfill their duty to their country.

C. B. C. Begins Construction Of New Station

OTTAWA, Sept. 26 (CP)—Construction of the first unit of a short range radio station capable of reaching Europe under favorable conditions, has been started at Quebec, the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation announced today.

The station will be in operation early in December.

It will be powered to 7 1/2 kilowatts but so designed that it may be increased to 50 kilowatts which is standard for short-wave broadcasting stations.

The new station will concentrate on carrying Canadian programs to audiences which cannot be reached by long wave broadcasting. Broadcasts will not be beamed in any particular direction but will cover North and South America.

Speeches of Canadian public men, war programs and newscasts will be made available to the United States, the West Indies and South America and British programs will be rebroadcast.

Will Drive Pirate Huns From Skies

LONDON, Sept. 26 (CP Cable)—Air Marshal W. A. Bishop, V.C., of the Royal Canadian Air Force, told the British people over a British Broadcasting Corporation network tonight that Britain's airmen will drive the "pirate Huns from the skies of Europe" as they did 25 years ago.

Telling his audience that it was a thrill to speak to them on British soil, he recalled that a quarter century ago it was his privilege to command here the great conflict, "a Canadian stripping fired with ambition like thousands of other boys to do my humble, best duty towards victory."

Nazi Plotter Says It Was 'Only A Joke'

MONTEVIDEO, Uruguay, Sept. 26 (AP)—Adolfo Fuhrmann, one of eight Germans accused of plotting the Nazi conquest of Uruguay, assumed full responsibility for the plot today but insisted it was "a joke."

Fuhrmann's fellow defendants pleaded guilty at arraignment to the charge of attempting to subvert the government and institutions.

Fuhrmann said he thought of the plan as a joke upon fellow Germans in Argentina following their invasion of Patagonia, southernmost region of Argentina. The other defendants, he said, were unaware of his plot.

The court suspended further hearings until the Chamber of Deputies forwards the files of its investigating committee which four months ago announced findings to the effect that the Nazis plotted what amounted to a foreign invasion.

Poles Rally To Empire's War Cause

OTTAWA, Sept. 26 (CP)—Poles all over the Dominion are rallying to the Empire war cause, Victor Podolski, Polish Consul-General in Canada, said today. Letters come in a constant stream from Poles in a constant stream from Poles asking in what way they may aid.

"The faith and confidence of our people in a British victory is total," said Mr. Podolski.

"Thousands have written to ask if a voluntary Polish army is to be formed in Canada, and if not, how they proceed to get into the Polish forces now somewhere in England."

The Polish Consul-General made no comment on the possibilities of Poles forming battalions in Canada or on the Netherlands battalions similar in process of organization. But now in another source it was learned that formation of such Polish battalions is being considered.

ON RIGHT SIDE NOW

Twenty-two years ago, Ernest R. Charles were the field gray of the Imperial German army. He was awarded four medals, wounded in eight places, and won the Iron Cross. Today, a naturalized Canadian with a Scottish-English wife, Lance-Corps. Seran were the uniform of the Craggy Highlanders. Britain will win, he says. NO COMMENT ON "RED" GOLD

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26 (CP)—Treasury Secretary Henry Morgenthau declined today to comment on the arrival last week of \$11,175,000 worth of gold from Russia.

This was the second time in years that any gold has reached the United States from the Soviet Union.

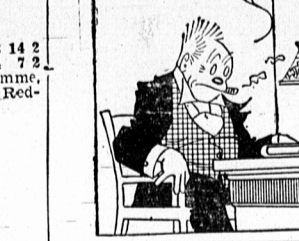
