

Vaseline stains may be removed from wash goods by soaking in wood alcohol and rubbing with the hands. Then wash in hot soapuds. Keep the alcohol away from fire.

A recipe for axle grease is a pound of tallow, half a pound of castor oil quarter of a pound of Vaseline. Melt the tallow and rub the whole well together.

When storing cutlery, wipe the blades lightly with a little vaseline.

Before using wash in soda water and clean in the usual way.

FORESHADOWED GREATER EVILS  
The question was not one to be handled by a political party as a warring but one to be gone into on scientific and business lines so that a solution and removal, or modification of the evils might be found. Under present conditions he foreshadowed greater evils to come, and unbearable conditions. Study alone could help the people of Canada in the cry that had gone up from ocean to ocean for cheaper means of livelihood.

Professor Leacock delved into the question of the gold supply of the past and present. It was a matter of common belief with many that the discovery of America and the exploitation of the gold mines of the new land meant that there was a great deal of gold sent to Europe. Compared to the quantities of gold mined at the present day, and during the past fifty years, the supply of those days was small indeed.

THE FLOW OF GOLD  
Gold in those ancient days was brought home to Europe at the rate of \$4,000,000 per year, and after 400 years the supply had reached to only \$800,000,000. Coming down to the 19th century, it would be found that the supply did not increase greatly, but at the middle of the century, the increase became great, and went as high as \$40,000,000, but in the year 1887 when the Russian, South African and California gold fields came to be worked, the figures soared to \$110,000,000 per year, and by the middle of the '90's it had gone to \$200,000,000, 1900 to \$300,000,000, and in 1910 it had reached \$400,000,000 per year.

According to estimates, there was at present available in gold coinage the sum of seven billion dollars, and of gold available, coined and not coined, fourteen billion dollars. This means that the gold supply during the past fifteen years had doubled.

A SERIOUS SITUATION  
"This is a very serious situation," declared the speaker "and the chances are that the production will continue to go on. Johannesburg mines can be carried on at the present rate of mining all through the century before the last of the gold is taken out. It is calculated that in 1913 only 11 per cent. of the gold of these mines had been taken out. There is another factor to be considered. The working of gold was becoming cheaper all the time. In order to get out one pound of gold it is necessary to handle 80,000 pounds of earth, and whereas ten years ago it cost 27 shillings to do this work, it now costs only 17 1/2 shillings.

"The situation of gold increasing in quantity forces down the universal relation between gold and a commodity. Cheap gold and high prices are merged together, one and the same. Cheap gold is dear bread. Our struggle for gold is bringing to us the devil's gift of dear bread."

judgments of the question, but we must get at the question itself from a reasonable point of view. Every penny that is taken out of the pockets of the poor man is being put into the pockets of the rich."

The professor next dealt with "captains of industry," and their relation to the cost of living. "There are those who are hailed as captains of industry who have done nothing but take advantage of the windfall," he declared. "If inflated prices could mean anything more than that one loses and another gains, you might say that the race is to the swift, and the battle to the strong, but this is not so.

"Sooner or later the shift of the gold standard will bring down both the poor and the rich, and that is the danger."

Getting to the question of remedies, the professor referred to the "Industrial Commission," which was established in the United States in 1899 for the purpose of investigating the industry of the country. It was made up of bankers, statesmen, financiers, and all classes of the people. Witness after witness was examined, until there was filed available information on every subject affecting the people of the country in the matter of industry. The report of the Commission was given in 1902.

NEED OF INFORMATION  
"Every positive piece of legislation in the United States since that time has been due to the information gathered by that Commission," declared Professor Leacock, "That is what we need in this country. Let us first get at the facts of the case, and then we can make decisions."

PLAIN FACTS OF REASON  
"It is often said that the tariff is responsible. Far be it for me to introduce politics. The high cost of living is said to have got to be one of the slogans of one of the political parties. I hope this is not true. We have too many slogans in Canada now, and too little truth. It is not a thing to make mimic sport of for the benefit of office seekers. Let us get to the plain facts of reason.

"I would not say that the tariff was responsible when in 1890 we had a very high tariff and low prices, or in 1913 when we had a very high tariff and high prices; in England in 1900 when they had no tariff and high prices and in England in 1913 when they have no tariff and high prices. If anyone can make anything of these facts he is quite welcome to do so.

"The tariff, however, can be used as one of the means of getting lower prices. This is what is being done in the United States. It is understood the policy of Woodrow Wilson is to pull down the walls of American protection. He is convinced that the tariff will had got higher than was necessary for the protection of the American workman, and that the increase has gone to the monopolists.
