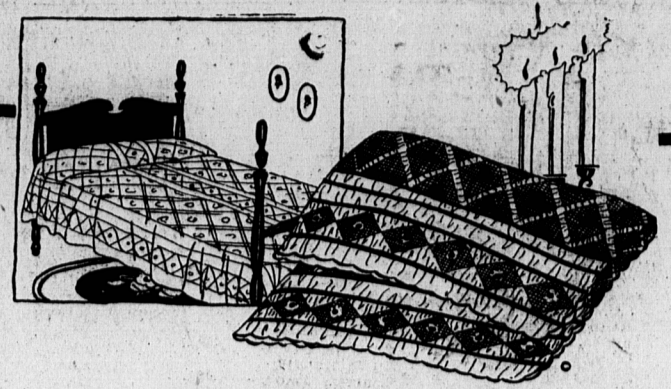

IN MEMORIAM

MR. ALEXANDER F. BRUCE

Possessed of many of the best Highland characteristics, after a few days illness, Mr. Alexander F. Bruce died on Monday morning in his home, Valleyfield, at the ripe age of eighty-three years; leaving surviving him his family of two daughters, namely Mrs. McPherson, Los Angeles, Cal., and Mrs. Todd, Summerside; and three sons, Callum, Vernon River, Munro, Valleyfield, and Willard, Manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia, Centreville, N. B., and their children. His wife, a daughter of the late William MacKinnon, Uigg, predeceased him a few years. A surviving brother, Donald, he visited in Dakota when on his way to spend a winter with his daughter in California. He outlived his sisters, and another brother, Doctor Bruce, St. John, distinguished in his profession. Mr. Bruce was a helpful member of the United Church of Canada with wise counsel and material aid. His home was a centre of hospitality. On public questions he was well informed, and at one time represented Murray Harbour District in the Provincial Assembly. For many years he carried on a wholesale business at Montague. Acquiring a sufficient competence, he retired from active business some years ago, and enjoyed the evening time of his long life, in travel, study, and at work about his comfortable home. With an erect figure and striking personality, he was well known, and will be much missed by his many friends in our Southern Community amongst whom he lived—a man of
