STEAMER ARRIVED.—Saturday the Northumberland arrived in Pictou from Charlottetown at 11.00 a. m. She left again about 2.40 p. m. with passengers, express, mail and freight and arrived at 6.15 p. m. She leaves today at 7.30 a. m.

GONE TO VANCOUVER.—Rev. Dr. Pringle, Sydney, has gone to Vancouver, where he has a daughter seriously ill. Before he left, the congregation of the St. Andrew's Church presented him with a purse of gold.

TEACHER RESIGNS.—The Guardian regrets to learn that Lieut. G. F. Campbell has tendered his resignation as teacher on the West Ken School staff. It is to be hoped that the school board will be successful in obtaining a male teacher capable of instructing the cadet corps, in which Mr. Campbell has instructed so successfully in the past.

HAPPY EVENT.—The marriage was solemnized at the Presbyterian Manse, by Rev. Mr. Ramsay, last evening, of Miss Sarah Alice Hutchinson, of Prince Edward Island, to David M. Wilkes, of the Robb Engineering Company. After the ceremony, Mr. and Mrs. Wilkes left on a short wedding trip. On their return, they will reside in Amherst.

A SLANDER CASE.—E. A. Reilly barrister of this city, returned this afternoon on the Ocean Limited from Summerside, P. E. I., where he was called in connection with a slander case of McMillan versus Mestrel. The case was up before the Supreme Court of Prince Edward Island with Judge Hazzard presiding. Although Mr. Reilly had no power to act as an attorney, he was there in connection with the plaintiff's side of the case which was stood over until next Tuesday.—Moncton Exe.

IN SHIPPING CIRCLES.—S. S. Cape Breton left Charlottetown yesterday afternoon for this port direct with full cargo of produce. S. S. Morwenna, due at Montreal today, will make two more trips here if possible from P. E. Island. S. S. Capouana, which was to leave Montreal Saturday night, had not been reported up to last evening though it is thought she got away on time. S. S. City of Sydney was to leave there last night and probably did so. S. S. Sindhbad also leaves Montreal tomorrow and as the whole of these will call at P. E. Island on the way here, they will take much of the freight offering at that place. There is talk now of another ship beside the Belleveure, chartered to the Dominion Coal Co., being employed with her to carry freight from P. E. Island also.—St. John's, Nfld. Exe.

TEMPERANCE QUESTION.—Temperance agitators like many other good people sometimes forget themselves. This seems to have been the case with Rev. Mr. Thomas at Moncton on Sunday when he attacked the Flemming Government for its lack of interest in temperance legislation. If Mr. Thomas had been perfectly straightforward he would have said that what he desires is not temperance at all but complete prohibition. The excessive use of liquor is admitted to be an evil by all classes of the community. This much admitted, the question of mitigating the evil is the important issue. Apparently no two people think exactly alike on how this is to be accomplished; but generally speaking, there are in a broad sense two opinions. One party contends that the evil is lessened better by regulation, while the other that of liquor altogether is the only remedy. The question which the government of New Brunswick was asked to consider was the introduction of a measure similar to that in operation in Prince Edward Island. This request was made to the Robinson Government and a commission was appointed to investigate the conditions on the Island and also in the counties of New Brunswick in which the Scott Act was in operation.—St. John Exe.

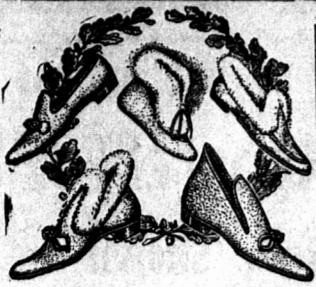
