Legion history will be created on a historical site when veterans of both great wars meet on the floor of the veterans parliament, and are united in purpose through out veterans problems at the Dominion Convention in Quebec from May 19th to May 23rd.

Within sunrise hearing distance of the great battle between the forces of Wolfe and Montcalm, veterans descendants of these pioneers will make their voices heard throughout the nation in a clarion call for veterans' rights. No sombre holiday this, but a serious meeting of those chosen from branches from the rugged mountainous Yukon to the Atlantic washed Maritimes.

Prince Edward Island will be represented by 12 delegates. They include: D. L. Mathison, Provincial Command representative; J. MacGulgan, H. H. Court and A. J. Connolly, representing the Charlottetown branch; N.W. Lowther, Dominion Command representative; M. C. Reynolds, Montserrat; Roland Phibson, M.P. Titus and Lester Jenkins, Summerside; and J. Anthony Gallant, Wellington. Mrs. Arthur Henry and Mrs. A. J. Coffin will represent the Ladies' Auxiliary to the Legion.
