EIGHT DROWNED MANY MISSING IN STORM ON LAKES

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Mar. 16.—The tug Silver Spray, of Erie, Pa., foundered early this morning in a violent gale outside Cleveland harbor and the eight men aboard were drowned.

The men drowned are: James Purdy, captain; Charles Purdy, Charles Purdy, Jr.; Robert Watts, engineer, and Thomas Reed, of Erie; Edward Holmes, Charles Brasse and Henry Anderson, of Cleveland.

Four other tugs are missing, and it is the opinion of lake men that they have met the same fate as the Silver Spray. The missing tugs are: The Lloyd May, Monarch, Harold B. and The Swan.

The Lloyd May is commanded by Captain Charles Purdy, the father of Captain James Purdy, who went down on the Silver Spray.

The storm is general on Lake Erie, and is accompanied by zero temperatures.



In an address which excited great enthusiasm among his hearers, spoke of the questions occupying so large a share of the attention of Orangemen today—namely, mixed marriages and bi-lingual schools. He also referred to reciprocity. With regard to the latter, he said he thought the present reciprocity resolution, if enacted, would bring about an intercourse between Canada and the United States that is calculated to weaken Canada's attachment to the mother country, and therefore make for commercial union with the United States. He spoke strongly on the subject of mixed marriages. The marriage contract, he said, was a civil contract, and the law states may be solemnized by an ordained minister of any of the churches. When that contract is so solemnized he thought no individual or church had a right to interfere. He suggested as a remedy an amendment to the criminal code, making it a punishable offence for any one to interfere in such cases. Bi-lingual schools were an encroachment upon the rights of the people and the rights of state. They also meant the introduction of the French national question. He also spoke in opposition to Home Rule for Ireland.

Colonel Hughes, on the subject of mixed marriages, stigmatized the decree of the Catholic Church affecting it as "a blot on our civilization." He declared the object of reciprocity between Canada and the United States was the ultimate annexation by the latter country.

Sir Knight W. H. Sproule, Ottawa, was yesterday elected Senior Deputy Grand Master of the Royal Black Chapter of Ontario East, which means that he will probably be Grand Master for 1912-13. Bliss, Smith's Falls; grand registrar, James Rhodes, Queensboro; honorary grand registrar, James Kelley, Lindsay; deputy grand registrar, W. A. Howard, Moore; grand treasurer, T. C. McConnell, Springbrook; deputy grand treasurer, S. H. Thompson, Madoc; grand lecturer, C. J. Smith, Madoc, and E. A. Morrow, Sterling; grand censors, E. A. Denby, Lyndhurst, and J. A. Sanderson, Kemptonville; standard bearer, J. Tompkins, Timpanville, and W. E. Tunman, Cookton; grand pursuivant, J. W. Elliott, Danford; grand committee, Sir Knights A. J. Love, W. W. Dreyer, R. F. Clark, J. W. Featherstone, G. J. Lowes, Robert Wood, and James Moore. The officers were installed by Brother Thomas Gilday, of Montreal, grand master of the Royal Black Chapter of British North America.

RUSSIA AND CHINA STRAINED SITUATION.

ST. PETERSBURG, March 12.—China has not yet replied to the last Russian Note, which amounted to an ultimatum, insisting upon closer adherence to the provisions of the treaty of 1881.

A despatch from Mukden says that the attempt by the Chinese Police to enter quarantine lines, has led to serious conflicts between the Police and Japanese guards at Fuscun. One Japanese and one Chinese, were killed and many wounded on both sides.

It is surprising the large number of people in this city who, when they want to inquire about their Morning Daily Guardian, or subscription, ask Central for the News Phone No. 133, or for the Advertising Phone No. 132-3, instead of 132-2; or when they want to inquire about advertising ask Central for the Subscription Phone No. 132-2, or for the News Phone No. 133, instead of 132-3; or when they want the News or Editorial department ask Central for the Subscription Phone No. 132-2, or the Advertising Phone No. 132-3, instead of 133, although all those departments and their respective phone numbers are plainly given in the telephone book. Some people, instead of looking at the book, even phone one of the above departments to find out what number to ask for to get another department. All this is a great waste of time on the part of the person phoning, the operator at the Central, and the clerk in the department wrongly phoned. The news staff, on an upper floor, cannot give the necessary information about either advertising or subscriptions, nor the advertising staff about subscriptions or news, nor the subscription staff about advertising or news. In other words the clerks know and can do but their work in their own departments, and if it were otherwise they would be continually running from one department to another, up-stairs and down, mixing work, wearing themselves out and causing the greatest possible confusion. On and after 7 p.m. daily it is useless to ask for any phone number except 133.

Patrons who consult their phone books for the numbers they really want will greatly lessen the work of the patient Central telephone and Guardian clerks and thus help make their lives much brighter and happier. 3-16dt.


RUSSIA PLAYING FOR TIME

PEKIN, March 16.—The Russian legation expects the Chinese Government to yield reluctantly, first offering to compromise but finally accepting the full demands of the Russian ultimatum.

The Chinese Foreign Board, charged over the situation is arguing that the Russian note was not peremptory, but on the contrary, was most friendly.

The capricious behavior of the Foreign Board indicates to lookers-on here an incapacity upon the part of the government to deal strongly with the situation. The legation quarter appears to consider that the legal aspects of the case are more favorable to China, and there seems to be no sympathy with the Russian contention that Russian traders should be exempt under the free trade clauses from even local taxation in Chinese territory. At the same time there is criticism of China's diplomacy in that she seeks to gain by tricky points which she is in no wise able to dispute with arms.

When intimidated by the threat contained in the original Russian note, China replied, apparently acquiescing in the demands that she adhere more closely to the treaty of 1881 affecting Russian consular and commercial privileges in the province and Mongolia. Russia thereupon stated that the reply was generally satisfactory, but asked for more explicit declarations on certain points. In the meantime the Chinese Government, encouraged by comments in the foreign press, had grown bolder, and its second note stated that the Russian charges were groundless in declaring that Russian traders did not enjoy
