—HIGH SCHOOL CURRICULUM DISCUSSED—The Summerside School Board conferred with Professor Lloyd Shaw, who is in charge of the Normal Training Course at Prince of Wales College, on Friday evening last, on the standard to be adopted for the new secondary school. Prof. Shaw, who is a member of the Maritime Examiners Board, gave much valuable information on the subject. He praised the School Board for adopting the Common Leaving School Examinations for entrance to universities as their standard for grades 11 and 12. This would bring them up to the standard of Nova Scotia schools. Prof. Shaw said that, with that standard, there was no reason why pupils should not be accepted for the teacher training course after passing their examinations. He advised dividing the school into two departments, primary and secondary. The first to be from grades I to VIII. The second grades 9, 10, 11 and 12. This is the method adopted by the Nova Scotia schools. Two extra teachers would be all that would be required, at least for some time. One of those teachers should be able to take grade 12. Prof. Shaw said that he would be only too pleased at any time to advise the board and teachers on any difficult question relating to the curriculum of the school or any other matter. He considered that the Board in asking for higher education for their school had made a distinct forward move and he hoped before long to see the Island schools on a par with the schools of Nova Scotia. 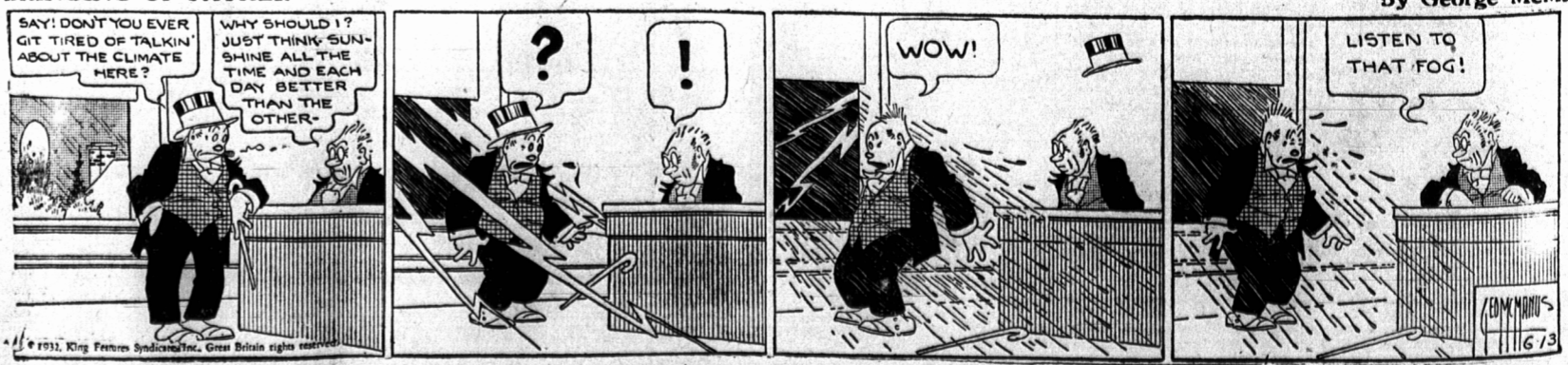
