Mid-summer found a good congregation at the morning service and a baritone solo "Litaney" splendidly rendered by Mr. Charles McKenzie, was greatly appreciated. Rev. The funeral of the late Rev. S. J. MacDonald took place from his old home at Monticello to St. Margaret's, Tuesday morning, 8th inst. It was very largely attended, not only by the people of his native parish, but also by many others who came to pay this last tribute of respect to the deceased priest. Over forty priests were in attendance, from all over the diocese.

Requiem Mass was celebrated by Rt. Rev. Monsignor J. C. McLean, P.A., V.G., with the following assistants: Rev. John Arch. McDonald, Deacon; Rev. A. L. Sinnott, Sub-Deacon; Rev. Dr. McMahon, Master of Ceremonies; Censer-bearer, Rev. P. Walsh; Acolytes, Rev. Peter Gallant and Rev. Walter McGuigan.

In the choir Rev. Theodore Gallant was organist, and singing was led by Rev. Bernard Gillis, D. D., assisted by Rev. Basil Croken and Rev. Urban Gillis.

A sermon appropriate to the occasion was preached by Rev. Father Kenny, S. J., who was conducting the retreat for the priests of the diocese at St. Dunstan's University. Service at the grave was conducted by Rev. K. C. MacPherson, P. P., with the choir already named.

Honorary pall bearers were: Rev. A. J. McIntyre, Rev. J. F. Johnston, Rev. M. Monaghan, Rev. Reginald McDonald, Rev. Fr. Arsenault, and Rev. Michael Francis.

The funeral was under direction of Undertaker A. A. Hennessey of Charlottetown, this being the first time that a motor hearse was used at St. Margaret's.

Splendid Reception Given Mr. J. F. Arnett At Alberton

Conservative Candidate Makes Splendid Impression At Joint Political Meeting, When He Is Ably Supported By Hon. J. D. Stewart And Mr. A. F. Arsenault.

In the large and commodious new hall at Alberton the first joint meeting for Prince County was held on Friday evening.

Hon. J. D. Stewart, leader of the opposition, was on the platform and gave a masterly speech in support of Mr. Arnett the Conservative candidate. The audience was the largest that had ever been seen in Alberton, every seat being occupied and the aisles crowded. Alberton and vicinity had always been a Liberal stronghold but there was a decided Conservative feeling throughout the meeting, notably when reference was made by Hon. Mr. Stewart to the stability of Mr. Bennett's word.

Mr. Arnett's Speech

Mr. J. F. Arnett, Conservative candidate, was the first speaker and took up the different issues of the election in a very able manner. The King administration, he said, was asking the people to vote for them on their record. What is their record? The Canadian National Railways has lessened in earnings ten millions of dollars, stocks have depleted, and there is an unfavorable trade balance. Unemployment is rife. People are brought from other countries and are not provided for. We have lost our grant for technical education and highways. The tradespeople asked the people to look into treaties we have are unfair to our farmers. Mr. Arnett dealt with these last session. his arguments in respect to sales tax, duty on potatoes, and many other things which are of vast importance at this time. In regard to old age pensions, there is no one in the Dominion more entitled to old age pensions than P. E. Islanders but we cannot have them but have to pay for part of the pensions of other provinces.

Alberton Wharf Neglected

What had the Liberal Government done for Alberton fishermen, Mr. Arnett asked. Rt. Hon. Mackenzie King had promised to repair the wharf but nothing had been done. The railway running to the wharf had fallen into disuse in spite of the fact that Prince County nine years ago had given Hon. Mr. Mackenzie King his seat in the House. Hon. Mr. Bennett's policy was a coast to coast policy for the Canadian people. Mr. King had to keep his eye on the States that he did not offend her. Mr. Arnett was in fine form and well received.

Liberal Candidate

Mr. A. E. McLean, Liberal candidate remarked he need not apologize to the people of Alberton for coming before them a fourth time. He said, he had no recollection of Mr. King making any promises to repair the wharf at Alberton. It was the Conservative party who had abandoned the railway leading to the wharf, he maintained. If Alberton could show sufficient reasons the railway would be rebuilt. He enlarged upon the bus-

ing off of the Western Province had never been attempted by any Government, Mr. McLean went on at some length as to the activities of his Government. He said the United States had used Canada a little rough and that was the reason they had put on those countervailing duties.

Provincial Leader's Address

Hon. Mr. Stewart, leader of the opposition in the local Legislature, spoke for a little over twenty minutes and in a splendid but brief address gave his support to Mr. Arnett and brought cheers from the audience who were deeply impressed with what he had to say.

The magnificent audience before him Mr. Stewart said was a proof that the people were taking a keen interest in this election. He would not attempt to discuss what Mr. McLean had just told them but there was one thing that he was glad to see that Mr. McLean had become converted to the doctrine of the Conservative Party, in regard to the United States. Mr. McLean had remarked that the States had used the Canadians a little rough and they must be handled in like manner. A year or two ago Mr. McLean had said we must be careful not to offend the Great Country.

Mr. McLean did not say such a-bout old age pensions, continued Mr. Stewart who proceeded to review this important plank in the Conservative policy. Mr. McLean's remark as regards Mr. Bennett being a multi-millionaire was very small politics. He did not think that was a disgrace to any man as he had arrived there by his own toll. (Applause.) A man who can obtain that position by his own efforts is surely worthy of the trust that has been placed in him as leader of his party (more applause).

Mr. Bennett had stated in plain language that he would give the Old Age Pensions to every province on the same basis and from the Federal Treasury, and Mr. Bennett will stand by that promise. No old age pension is paid to you because the local government will not bear the expense. Our governments poverty will not allow us to adopt the policy but we have to contribute to the other Provinces. Mr. Stewart dealt with the increased subsidy which we have not received also with the recommendation, still unimplemented. The amazing statement of Mr. McLean's that the Island would receive a fabulous sum was shown to be simply an election statement. The audit board consists of paid officials three chartered accountants in the employ of the Dominion Government, (hear, hear.) The speaker was surprised that Mr. McLean should try to put such statements over such an intelligent audience. That matter has still to be dealt with and no one has any estimate as to what it will be.

The highway grant was another matter which Mr. Stewart considered of the utmost importance. Unless the Conservatives are returned to power we can not hope for any relief. The Provincial Government is short of revenue and unless we can get assistance from the Federal Government we cannot expect anything better than we have now. We have to borrow large sums annually for our highways at present and get no relief. Mr. McLean gave us figures but no one is any the wiser at the finish. He also played upon the butter issue. It was the principal commodity here and a large amount of money has been realized out of the industry. Farmers do not see the joke that the Liberals seem to make of it. It needs no expert to tell us that the foreign butter is under selling our own. Mr. Stewart's remarks were received with great cheering.

Dr. John McNill then came forward on behalf of Mr. McLean, but did not help matters very much. He had a good deal of literature on different matters but unfortunately did not have time to read it. He repeated his statements made at Miscouche that when the subsidies were paid they would be so large that the local Government could pay the teachers a living wage and old age pensions to the old folks.

Hon. Adrian Arsenault was greeted with prolonged applause when he arose to speak. He spoke with feeling of the interest taken in the election when people would come in such large numbers to listen to them that night. He was heartily cheered when after outlining the resources of Canada he asked the electors to do their duty and vote for the man that will conserve for her own use, her vast resources.

THE MARKETS

MONTREAL, Que., July 12—An advance of one cent per pound in the wholesale price of butter featured the Montreal dairy and produce markets last week. At the close, eastern townships number 1 pasteurized creamery butter was 27 3-4 cents per pound to the retail trade. Prices were 28 cents for solids and 30 cents for prints. Receipts for the week were 19,771 boxes. The cheese market was a little firmer last week, closing at 15 1-4 for Ontario and 15 1-2 for Quebec cheese. Exports from Montreal to Europe showed a big gain, totalling 41,703 boxes compared with 16,436 during the previous week. The week's receipts were 44,098 boxes. The egg market held steady with a little firmer undertone due to falling production and less stocks in the country. Receipts were 13,014 cases. New potatoes were cheaper, but old potatoes were dearer last week. Closing prices were \$5.50 per 100 pound barrels for Number one imported new potatoes, \$2.25 per 80 pound bag of new local potatoes and \$2 per 80 pounds in bulk for old potatoes.

HON. JOHN A. MACDONALD, CONSERVATIVE CANDIDATE FOR KINGS

In the last two Parliaments the Hon. John A. MacDonald was known at Ottawa as "The member for Prince Edward Island." What this implied was that his was the only personality from the Province that impressed itself upon the House. He is held in the highest esteem and greatly respected on both sides of the House. It was no surprise in Ottawa when Mr. Melghen included Mr. MacDonald in his Government, as he was one of the outstanding men from the Maritime Provinces then at Ottawa. Mr. MacDonald, never-the-less, is of a retiring disposition. He is not a self-advertiser, and prefers to pursue his even terms, working for his constituency, province and county, steadily, regularly and unobtrusively. He has been in politics since the days of his youth, and was one of the stalwarts that represented King's County in the Provincial arena along with such political giants as the Hon. J. A. Mathieson and the Hon. John MacLean. He has been in opposition and in the government in both the local legislature and in the Dominion. In business he is a merchant at Cardigan, known well, and wherever farm produce is in demand, he being known in local politics as "keeper."
