—EARLY MORNING FIRE AT SUMMERSIDE—A bad fire occurred early Saturday morning at Summerside which razed to the ground a large boiler house belonging to James Watson and situated at the extreme northeast of the town. The fire alarm was rung in by the electric light operator who had gone outside for a breath of air, and saw the blaze from the back of the light plant. It was about 2.40 a. m. When the firemen arrived, which they did only minutes after the alarm rang, the main building was well ablaze and a smaller building which contained three pigs, had caught fire. However, the pigs were saved. A larger building where 29 pigs were housed was saved and the pigs taken to safety. The boiler house was burned to the ground. It was not known how the fire started or the value of property. It is understood it would be in the vicinity of \$2500.

miles south of Attu island, the most westerly of the Aleutians, the Japanese ships reached or whether a landing was accomplished. It was never known here whether Canadian planes, which for some time have been cooperating with the United States forces in defence of Alaska, took part in the raids.

The four attacks on Kiska Island, which contains a deep-water harbor suitable for a seaplane base, were made by long-range army bombers. The Japanese were dropped on shore installations and even are erecting as fast as possible in order to consolidate their hold on the strategic island. Recent Japanese air activities there, including anti-aircraft guns and other plants, to assure their food supplies.
