

# P. W. C. Take Measure Of Navy Team



## Local College Squad Outspeed Rivals To Notch Up First League Win

Outspeeding and outsniping their opponents in every period, Prince of Wales Welshmen last night broke into the win column in the City Hockey League, when they defeated a hard-trying Navy team 11-5 in a rugged, fast, ragged encounter.

High voltage action was again the order of the encounter, that at times threatened to break out into a real "Donnybrook" and did see a brief flareup of fistfights early in the third period, but no real damage was done, the combatants cooling off quickly when chased to the penalty bench.

Taking a 2-0 lead in the first period, the Prince of Wales team increased their margin to 7-2 by the end of the middle canto, and then went on to outscore their opponents 4-3 in the third and final canto.

### Outspeed Navy

Prince of Wales once they had taken the lead were never in any serious danger. They consistently outsped their opponents in every frame but at that had the Navy team snipers been onto their game there might have been a different story to tell. Time after time they were in close scoring range only to either miss the net or be turned back by the smart goal-tending of Ivan MacArthur who made sensational saves time after time as Navy attackers skated into close range.

### Blanchard Injured

The victory may have proved a costly one to the Prince of Wales team however, for late in the first period, Elmer Blanchard, smart pivot of the Nicolle, Robertson duo suffered a broken finger and will be lost to the team for an indefinite number of games.

### Wide-Open

Fast and wide-open was the order of play as the game got underway. For the first two minutes neither team had a real scoring chance until "Pud" Beer broke into the clear only to be robbed by O'Shea. Prince of Wales were en-

joying a slight edge with O'Shea's rising shot. Nicolle's rising shot at 9:21. Seeing the disc at centre, Angie MacDonald slipped the wafer to Robertson and the stocky winger rounded the lone defence man to effect the puck off O'Shea's pads for the opening counter. Skidding to the attack, P.W.C. shot their second goal a little better than three minutes later from a melee in front of the Navy net. McLenan slammed the puck over the top of the net, and then took a pass from Quigley. Here Navy started to force matters, Junop was robbed by MacArthur at the goalmouth on a breakaway. Lightizer of P.W.C. was given a five minute sentence when objecting to a foul by MacArthur. Lightizer was also given a minor penalty and then MacArthur really rose to goal tending heights as he turned back Navy attackers three times in the last couple of minutes to keep his team's 2-0 lead intact.

### Rugged Action

They went at it with high sticks, knees and everything else the rules permit. The second period with Prince of Wales, sniping with deadly effect. ## Point Scoring May Be Used In Louis-Conn Scrap

NEW YORK, Jan. 17 (AP)—Although no major outdoor bonus was held during the year, professional boxing in New York State grossed nearly \$4,000,000 in 1945, Col. Edward P.P. Egan reported today.

Chairman of the New York State Athletic Committee, Egan said that the four-point scoring system last March. Since then, draw decisions have been eliminated, but followers of the sport have drawn out the merits of the system.

Several weeks ago Egan said he could see no reason for any change in the point-scoring system should the fight be held in New York. At the time of the first Louis-Conn scrap at the Polo Grounds in June, 1941, when the old round-by-round method of scoring was effective, Conn was ahead, seven rounds to five, at the end of 12 rounds. In the 13th he made the mistake of trying to slug it out with the champion and was knocked out.

Under the Egan four-point system of scoring the winner of the round is credited with one point if in the opinion of the judges, he was the round by a shade. If the margin is definite he gets two points. If the margin is one-sided, but there is no knockdown, the winner gets three points. If a knockdown occurs, the winner receives the maximum of four points.

Thus, if at the end of 15 rounds, a judge has each winning seven rounds, one even, he would add up the points for each. If the point totals are even, he would decide which one finished stronger and name that one the winner.

To be more explicit, the Giants needed pitchers possibly worse than any other club in the National Baseball League, having had none to speak of since Carl Hubbell finally hung up his screwball a few years ago. So they bought themselves a splendid catcher, Secretary Ed Brannock was asked, confidentially, if he didn't think maybe Stoneham was slipping.

"Far from it," Ed replied airily. "We've got Cooper, and we'll get the pitchers. We've got the money and we're ready to pay the right price for them. What do you think Sam Breadon is going to do with those 18-odd pitchers on the Cardinals roster? He can't send them to the minors, ha!"

It was pointed out that Breadon so far had shown no sign of wanting to pare down his crop of flingers at least a dozen of whom are of demonstrated big league calibre. "Don't worry," Brannock counseled. "Breadon doesn't know for sure yet what players will be out of the army when the season begins. But he will have a pretty good idea along about March 1, and then you're going to see some added pitchers. I guarantee there will be more sales and trades and general shuffling around in March and April than anybody ever thought of before."

"In case anybody is worried, just say that we have no thought of opening the race without some added pitchers. We'll have one of the heaviest teams in the league, and the pitching to go with it."
