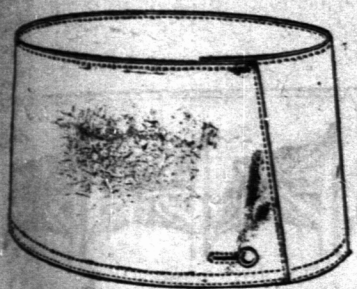

The recent dry weather has given rise to serious forest fires in various parts of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, and on Wednesday last the danger from the like cause was brought home to the people of Rice Point and Nine Mile Creek in a startling way. The fire in this instance began with the burning of stumps in clearing operations near the mill pond on Nine Mile Creek at the rear of the lots of both settlements. A strong north west gale was blowing and once the fire was caught in the bush it went sweeping all before it. The farmers fought hard to save their fences but for a distance of a mile and a half each way from the point of starting the rear fences, and sections of the line fences between farms were totally destroyed. A very serious loss amounting to thousands of dollars was realised in the burning of the woodlands and poles which in this section had not been burned since the first settlement of the country. At Rice Point the dwellings and outbuildings were only saved by the great efforts of many willing workers. The fire, blown by the wind, would frequently catch 500 yards in advance of the main body of the flames. The lesson of Wednesday's fire ought to be taken to heart by all as showing the imperative necessity of the greatest care in the use of fire in clearing operations in dry weather.

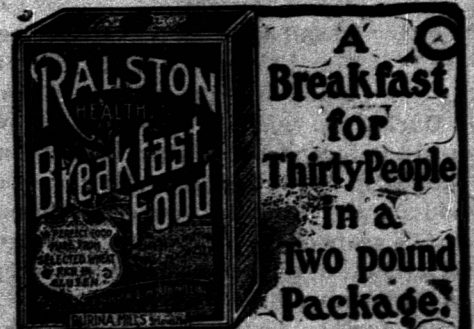
