

### DEATH BY MISADVENTURE

From Yesterday's Evening Guardian (Canadian Press)  
 EPSON, June 10—The coronor's jury inquiring into the death of Miss Emily Wilding Davison, the militant suffragette, who died Sunday from the effects of injuries received when she attempted to stop the King's horse in the Derby, brought out a verdict today of death by misadventure.

The courtroom was crowded. King George's joke, who was severely injured, was unable to attend the trial. The evidence showed nothing to indicate that Miss Davison's mind was unhinged. The coroner said the deceased only intended to disturb the race. The jury, he said, might also dismiss the idea that she singled out the King's horse. She wanted to make a demonstration for the cause of Woman's Suffrage.
