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**EGG WATER**

Egg water, prepared by blending with a pint of cold water the whipping of whites of two eggs, and flavored with salt, cinnamon or lemon, or an egg-flip, made by syphoning soda on to the whipped-up volk of an egg, are nutritious alternatives.

Another suggestion is black-currant tea. It is prepared very simply by pouring boiling water over black-currant jam, which must be the genuine unadulterated article. Allow to cool, then strain and drink hot.


