HONOLULU, April 19. (A.P.)—Orlison, Los Angeles psychiatrist, Alienist testimony that Lieutenant Thomas H. Massie was insane at the moment Joseph Kahahawai was killed, put the prosecution in a fighting mood today as the defense effort to clear four persons of the lynching approached its finale.

BUDGET PRESENTED TO HOUSE YESTERDAY

Neville Chamberlain In First Budget Speech Maintains Heavy Load Of Taxation Imposed In Emergency Measure Last September.

(By George Hambleton, Canadian Press Staff Writer) LONDON, April 19—(Canadian Press Cable)—The long-suffering British taxpayer found no relief in today's budget. In the first budget speech he has made Neville Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer, maintained the heavy load of taxation imposed in the emergency budget of last September.

With taxation changes, the national balance sheet for 1932-33 stands as follows:
