"And further resolved that copies of this resolution be sent to the Prime Minister, the Honourable W. L. Mackenzie King, the Minister of Defence, the Honourable J. L. Ralston, the Minister of Finance, the Honourable J. L. Aisley and the Premier of Prince Edward Island, the Honourable J. G. Campbell;

"It is resolved that we the members of the Women's Missionary Society, now assembled in District Rally at Eidon, do put ourselves on record as expressing our desire for a reconnection at this time in our nation's history and a more prayerful interpretation of our task both at home and abroad, we recognize the need for a vital individual relationship to God as the basis of all our work."

Sincere thanks was extended to all who so kindly assisted in making this rally so pleasant and profitable.
