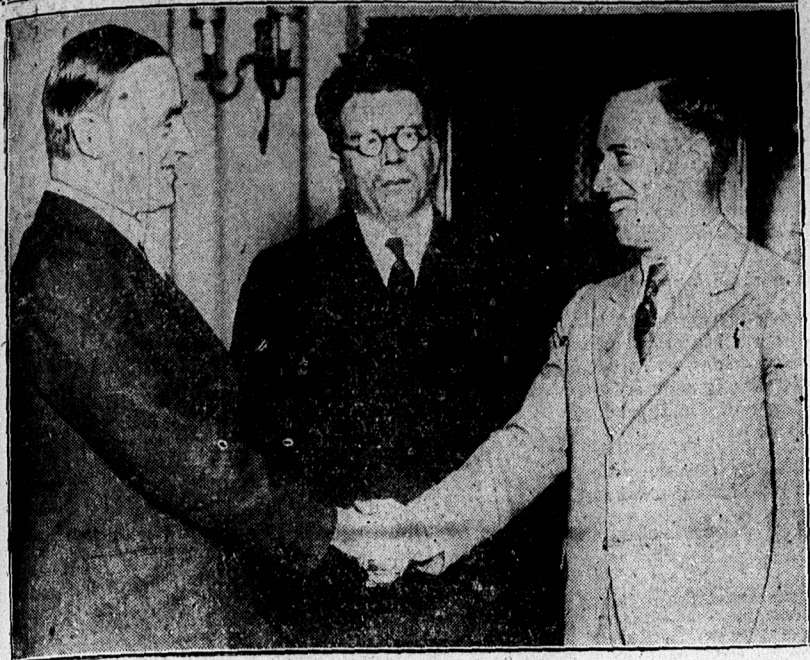

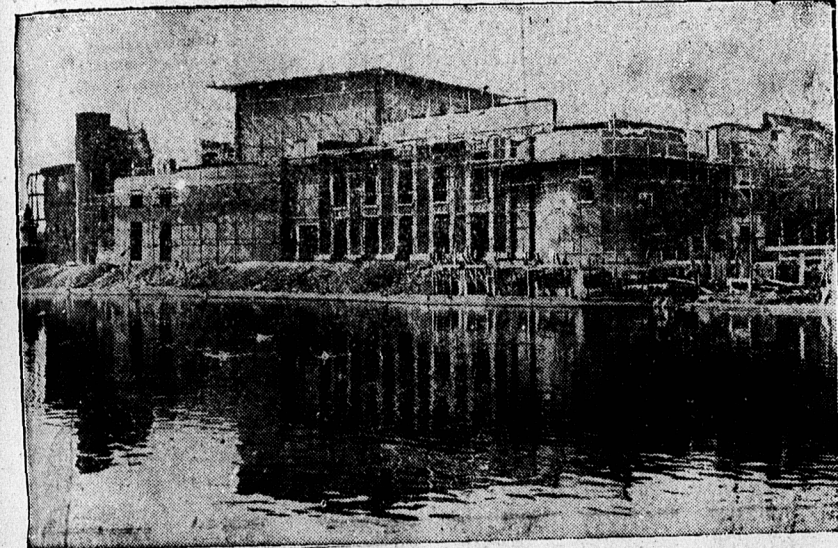
OVER TRANSATLANTIC TELEPHONE

HABITANTS STILL BAKE IN OUT-OF-DOOR OVENS

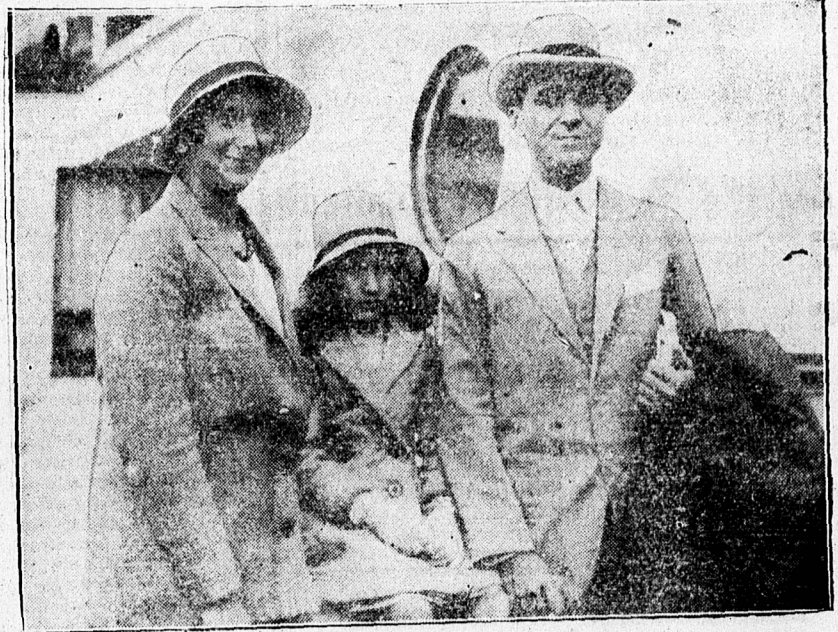

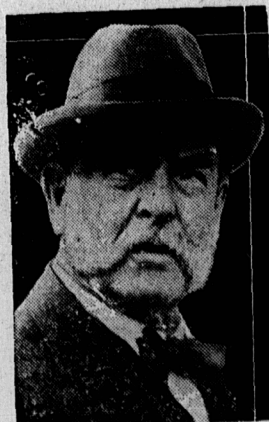
HEADS NEW MOVEMENT

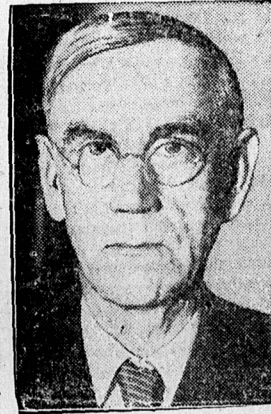
FINANCE DEAN DEAD
