HOW THE GRITS NOW PLAY THE GAME OF POLITICS

Campaigning in Quebec Under the Guise of Recruiting.

OTTAWA, Dec. 7.—Liberal politicians, who, under cover of the war spirit and the call for a stronger force of Canadians in the field, go about the country with the real purpose of making capital for their party, are rendering a poor service to Liberalism. It is doubtful if anywhere, at any time, Liberal politicians have stooped to a meaner expedient than this, and their record is by no means stainless.

The Trick Being Played

The trick is being played in Quebec and Ontario. The scene is a recruiting rally usually some outlying point. A Liberal speaker appears. As often as not he is a man who occupies a place of some prominence in the country and has held office in the last Liberal Government. He appears at the meeting as the chief speaker for the stimulation of recruiting in the district. He begins a patriotic speech, declares that the cause is just and that the need for more men is great. As he goes on his speech becomes less and less a patriotic appeal and more and more of a stump speech in aid of the Liberal party. The occasion is used for an attack upon the Government. Sometimes it is done more cleverly than at others, because some of the men who deal in this kind of thing are less expert than others, but the object is always the same though at times the work is crude.

Guard Against It

There are a number of adjectives which might be used to describe a campaign of this kind, but it is not necessary to use them. The mere statement of the case should be sufficient to brand the thing for what it is, and to put the people on their guard against it.

The Liberal party in Canada has suffered enough at the hands of its leaders, during the last few years without being obliged to take upon itself the shame of this last method borrowed from the political underworld. The Canadian people are in no mood to have the serious business of enlistment fashioned into a means for addressing the propaganda of any political party. There is too much at stake. If men like Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux are unable to distinguish between what is clean and what is unclean, they will learn the difference from the people themselves.

The Worst OFFENDERS

The worst offenders are those who talked the loudest of a political trick, who have declared not once or twice but many times that politics should be set aside. It was Mr. Lemieux who protested against the holding of a war election and declared that it would be a crime, and yet he goes before the public and declares another in Quebec, meetings called in the interest of recruiting, and seeks to plant the seeds of party discord. A man so acting risks the application of a very ugly word without purpose, and the one great purpose of Canadians at this time is to prosecute the war to a victorious issue. The man who seeks to a lesser purpose to the prejudice of this great national resolve, takes upon himself a very heavy responsibility.

HUNGARIANS AND BULGARIANS CLASHED

LONDON, Dec. 7.—The Times Athens correspondent telegraphs: "A serious clash between Hungarian and Bulgarian troops occurred at Nish following the Austro-German orders for the protection of the civil population against the Bulgarian atrocities."
"The patrolling of the city was entrusted to a Hungarian cavalry regiment, composed principally of men with race affiliations with the Serbians. The Bulgarians, unable to restrain their natural ferocity, disregarded the orders and began to assault women. This led to hand to hand fighting with the serious loss of life."
"The Hungarians maintained the upper hand."

CLOSED DANUBE PORT TO SHUT OFF AUSTRIANS

PARIS, Dec. 7.—Four Austrian monitors are prepared to leave Rustchuk in Bulgaria, on the Danube, to bombard Reni, a Danube port in Bessarabia, where a Russian army has assembled," says the Bucharest correspondent of the Temps.
"Information to this effect was received to-day and in consequence the Roumanian Government has decided to close all foreign navigation on the port of the Danube which flows through Roumanian territory."
FATAL ROW BETWEEN TWO CHINAMEN ON BRITISH COLUMBIA RANCH.
VANCOUVER, B.C., Dec. 7.—Yong Hock, a Chinaman is dead from injuries believed to have been inflicted by a fellow Chinaman, on a ranch near Sumas.

ADMITS GIVING POISON TO HER STARVING CHILDREN.

CAMDEN, N. J., Dec. 7.—Mrs. Mabel Fields (24) has confessed, the police announced to-day, that she deliberately poisoned her two babies on Thanksgiving eve because she had no food for the little ones and no money with which to buy it.
With her last fifteen cents, according to the police, she bought "rough on rats" oatmeal. They were rushed to Copper Hospital, where, despite physicians' efforts, both died.
