IN MEMORIAM

MRS. R. P. MURRAY.

On Friday morning the 10th inst. after a brief illness Catherine Isabel Gourley, beloved wife of the Rev. R. P. Murray of Mount Stewart, P. E. I., fell asleep in Jesus. Mrs. Murray was born in Sheet Harbour N. S., on August 24th, 1885, the youngest daughter of Dr. John McGeurley of that place. She received a liberal education graduating from Dalhousie University with the degree of B.A. in 1907, and winning the M. A. degree the following year. On Aug. 16th 1911 she became the wife of the Rev. R. P. Murray and for the remainder of her too brief but happy and beautiful life was the cherished and helpful companion of his joys and labours. Four healthy and promising children were born to them. Three sons John, William and Robert and one daughter less than two weeks old at the mother's death.

Mrs. Murray was a sweet and beautiful woman with an engaging personality a refined and cultured mind and a brave, bright spirit. She took a deep interest in the religious and social life of the Church and community and was especially active while her strength permitted, in patriotic work. She will be greatly missed and is deeply mourned by all classes and denominations. Her untimely death has saddened the whole community. The respect in which she was held and the sympathy felt for her sorrowing husband and friends was shown by the very large number who assembled at the funeral service which was held in the Presbyterian Church, Mt. Stewart on Sunday afternoon, conducted by the Revs J. M. McLeod St. Peters Bay; D. McVicar, Cardigan; R. L. Coffin, Marshfield and Carew Methodist. She was laid to rest in the quiet village cemetery amid the gentle weeping of the summer rain, until that morn when "Those angel faces smile" which we have loved since and lost awhile.

WANTS "PEACE OF JUSTICE"

Alsace-Lorraine and Italia Irredenta Restored, Free Poland, Turks Ousted From Palestine

NEW YORK, N. Y.—A cable message from Paris received by the official French Bureau of Information in this city, indicates that Mgr. Federico Tedeschini, who has been under Secretary of State of the Vatican, has succeeded Cardinal Gasparri as Papal Secretary of State.

Previous despatches direct from Rome credited "many Italian newspapers and some authorities on Vatican affairs," as affirming that Cardinal Gasparri had resigned, partly because of ill-health and partly because of the Pope's desire to institute a new policy in relation to Germany. The semi-official Vatican organ flatly denied, however, that the Cardinal had retired. The message received by the Bureau of Information quotes Mgr. Tedeschini as declaring for "a peace of justice." It follows:

"In a conversation which Mgr. Federico Tedeschini, new Secretary of State of the Vatican, had with the Rome correspondent of the A. B. C., a Spanish newspaper, he made the following interesting declaration:

"Only a Christian peace is desirable, because it will be a peace of justice. Some people have pretended that a Christian peace ought to be a white peace or a peace without result, that is, a peace bringing the world back to the status quo ante.

"This is not exact. We believe, on the contrary, that there are rights which justice, must respect. We cannot believe, for instance, that Catholic Poland will revert to the same state as it was before the war. As Christians we cannot approve that Palestine should remain under the Turkish yoke.

"We believe also that every one would be satisfied to see Alsace-Lorraine returned to France. We believe finally that if the Italian provinces now under Austrian domination should be returned to Italy, no Christian would oppose it, just as no Christian would declare himself opposed to the unification of Rumania in the East."

For a long time it has been common gossip in ecclesiastical circles in Rome that Cardinal Gasparri was not conducting the Papal Foreign Office to suit the Roman Curia. On the other hand, his friends stated that he was conducting it with absolute ecclesiastical and diplomatic correctness, adding that the fact that Catholic nations were at war imposed upon the Vatican a neutrality which could not betray sympathy even for one side or the other.

This war, however, before the visit Cardinal Mercier made to Rome late in 1915 to reveal personally to Pope Benedict XV. the details of the German atrocities in Belgium. After trying in vain to prevent, short of using bodily restraint, the Cardinal's visit the German authorities sent his Eminence of Sologne, Cardinal Hartmann, to watch him, and, if possible, to prevent a private audience with the Holy Father. Rightly or wrongly Cardinal Gasparri has been accused of furthering the designs of the

German Cardinal. In any case, Cardinal Mercier had his private audience with the Pope.

When the crisis was at its height the two Cardinals met at a reception, and Hartman said: "Reassure yourself, your Eminence, we shall not speak of war."

To which Mercier replied: "And you, Eminence, be reassured, we shall not talk of peace."

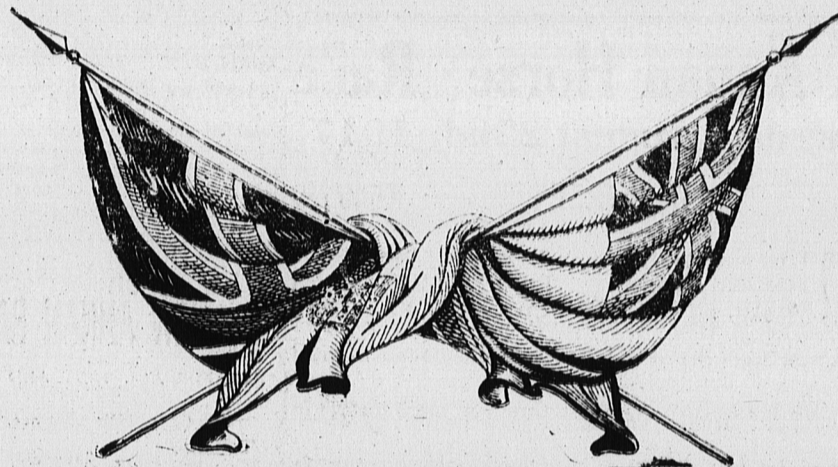
As Foreign Secretary it has been Cardinal Gasparri's duty to transact all the foreign business of the Vatican, both secular and ecclesiastical; but after the visit of Cardinal Mercier, the Pope himself has signed all letters pertaining to the atrocities and deportations in Belgium and France, whether these letters were addressed to ecclesiastics or heads of States. At the same time, it is also said, the Secretary has always insisted on the formality of conducting all negotiations personally with M. Vandenheuvel, the Belgian Minister at the Vatican, and in the absence of the Holy Father. It was

Gasparri also, and not the Pope, who is correct, became, according to report, more and more a source of annoyance to the Roman curia, as they believed that in a matter of so great importance His Holiness should be reached and heard without any ministerial intermediary.
