increase was justified or not. He did not approach this matter from a fault-finding standpoint. The election was now over, and there was not likely to be another for some time, so there was no need for seeking information merely for party advantage. He wanted to see the Government administered in the best interest of the Province, and it was for that reason that he called for information and sought to criticize expenditure.

It being now six o'clock the House adjourned.

FRIDAY, MARCH 31.

Mr. Speaker Martin took the chair at 10.15 a. m. Mr. A. MacDonald, was appointed law clerk to the Legislature.

MR. HUGHES RESUMES.

Mr. GEO. E. HUGHES, resumed the debate on the address. It appeared, he said, that the Government had received \$200,000 more in revenue per annum than their predecessors.

He thought should have been sufficient to remove the land tax or provided a surplus of from \$70,000 to \$100,000. The people were anxious to hear about the oats question, and he blamed the Leader of the Government for taking the matter of signing the steamer's charter out of the hands of the committee, resulting in delay and additional expense to the Morwenna was in France.

The Premier (interrupting) said the committee had sent in a signed report and the hon. member would see what the three gentlemen who signed had to say on the subject.

Mr. Hughes said that he saw that there had been a meeting of the committee, but he thought the report had been delayed by the absence of the secretary, but he would withhold any further remarks until the report was tabled. Referring to transportation Mr. Hughes dealt with the auto question and said it had been a live question in his district, and so long as he had responsible government there will be of the majority must rule. A petition had been submitted in favor of the Union Road district, but he had doubts about the genuineness of one of the names and he intended to ask the Government to table the petition for inspection. He had every confidence that the government would give such information to the public as they were entitled to as they asked for.

MR. HUGHES, in his maiden speech, said that he agreed with the mover of the address that they should devote more time to the immediate business of the province and deal less with digging into ancient history. They should not spend their time bickering when there were so many great things to do. He congratulated Mr. Hughes on the tone he had adopted in his speech. He spoke with a lot of good old-fashioned common sense, just what they might have expected from a level-headed business man. They differed from him in some questions, of course, but difference of opinion was to be expected, and he believed that Mr. Bell had also started out well but he soon descended to deplorably small politics that was characteristic of the hon. gentleman since he assumed the mantle of leadership, but he had reason to believe that the rank and file of the party did not approve of his tactics. He did not believe there was any truth in the charge by Mr. Bell that the government had been guilty of corruption. He knew perfectly well that no government was going to deliberately plan to corrupt the public, and he did not think the Leader of the Opposition really believed it either. He did not like to hear a good sermon preached, and then spoiled by the preacher not practising what he preached. The Leader of the Opposition had preached economy, but what did they find. The hon. gentleman had rendered a bill for \$148 to the Government in connection with his seven-venen hours speech at Summerside.

MR. BELL: There is no truth in the statement that I put in a bill against the Government.

MR. MCEWEN: I accept the hon. member's correction, but I would ask him whether he made such a charge directly or indirectly against the government.

MR. BELL: I never rendered any bill or authorized anyone to render a bill on my behalf.

MR. MCEWEN: I accept the explanation until such time as I produce the bill, but I am informed that such a bill has been rendered the Government, and putting down Mr. Bell's working day at 10 hours, it would appear that he was remunerated at the rate of \$27,250 per annum.

MR. BELL: I may say I was employed by the Temperance Alliance and not by the Government. I attended the hearing regularly for seventeen days being employed in the regular course of business. I never authorized anyone to render my account to the Government. I charged the Temperance Alliance in the ordinary course of business, and I look to them for payment.

Mr. McEwen here upon produced the bill which the Alliance had rendered the Government in which was included \$148.50 as the fee to the Leader of the Opposition. He said that was the account he referred to and it mattered little whether Mr. Bell looked to the Government or the Alliance for payment it was rendered to the Government.

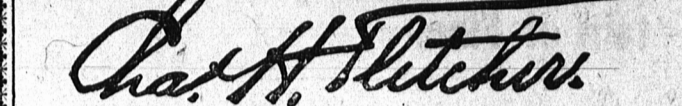
